# Transit Agencies Share Impacts of Fiscal Cliff with RTA Board

On March 27, CTA, Metra, and Pace leadership outlined service cut scenarios with the Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) Board if the transit fiscal cliff is not addressed. Significant impacts could be felt throughout NWMC member communities, with CTA bus service in northern Cook County and Pace weekend service throughout the NWMC region facing elimination, and Metra cutting train service in half for both weekday and weekend service. 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Implement Your Traffic Safety Interventions with a SS4A Demonstration Grant! Find Ideas and Solutions with NWMC Street Design Tools and Vision Zero Webinar

As the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP) wraps up its Safe Travel for All Roadmap (STAR) process with countylevel Safety Action Plans, municipalities are now eligible to apply for nearly \$1 billion in Safe Streets for All (SS4A) Planning and Implementation Grants and Demonstration Grants under the SS4A Federal Highway Administration (FWHA) NOFO. SS4A grant awards start at \$100,000, up to \$25,000,000, and applications are due by Thursday, June 26 at 4:00 p.m. Read more, including how to apply, at the SS4A grants webpage.

# Pace Launches I-290/I-88 Express Bus Study, Seeks Community Feedback

Pace Suburban Bus has launched a feasibility study to determine transit opportunities for an express bus service along the I-290 and I-88 corridors. Last Friday, a steering committee, including NWMC staff and member communities, met to discuss the concept and provide initial feedback and guidance to Pace and its consultants. As part of Pace's efforts to gauge the corridor's potential success, Pace is solicitating feedback from residents, workers and stakeholders via this survey. Members are requested to promote survey participation to residents and businesses.

# Tap Into Those Unused Rebuild Illinois Funds!

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) has notified communities which still have Rebuild Illinois (RBI) funds can retroactively apply them to projects and substitute out utilized motor fuel taxes (MFT) as far back as 2019. IDOT only requires a community wanting to utilize RBI funds for a project to adopt a resolution by Tuesday, July 1. For guidance on how to implement these funds, see IDOT Circular Letter 2020-16.
