North Shore and Northwest Councils of Mayors Approve Latest STP Programs

Both the North Shore and Northwest Council of Mayors had their quarterly meetings on July 18 and 19, respectively. The North Shore Council approved a cost increase for the Village of Morton Grove. Additionally, some projects in the program were actively reprogrammed to accommodate changes in project completion status, cost estimates, and other issues as needed. The Northwest Council approved a cost increase for the Village of Buffalo Grove.

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Juice Up Your EV Stations With the Charging and Fueling Infrastructure Grant Program!

If you're seeking grant funding to deploy public electric vehicle charging and alternative fueling infrastructure, you're in luck. The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) has just opened \$1.3 billion in funding through Round 2 of the Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (CFI) grant program. Community grants, focused on eliminating gaps in public EV charging infrastructure, will range from \$500,000 to \$15 million, with projects serving low- and moderate-income neighborhoods, communities with low ratio of private parking spaces to households, or high ratio of multiunit dwellings to single family homes will receive prioritization. Corridor grants, with a focus on EV and alternative fueling infrastructure along designated corridors, will range from \$1 million with no maximum limit.

Updated IDOT Crash Data Now Available

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) has made its 2023 crash data available via the IDOT Safety Portal. Access requires a registered account, approved by the County Engineer. Data in the portal includes individual crash reports, crash locations, crash report images, 10 years of historic and trend analyses, and summary reports. IDOT is still finalizing its 2023 Crash Facts publication, which will be made available on the same site as the 2022 Crash Facts publication. USDOT Opens Safe Streets and Roads for All Grant Applications

The U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) has issued a NOFO for the <u>Safe</u> <u>Streets and Roads for All (SS4A)</u> grant funding. The SS4A program funds regional, local, and Tribal initiatives through grants to prevent roadway deaths and serious injuries, including CMAP's <u>Safe Travel for All</u> <u>Roadmap</u>. Applications for Planning and Demonstration Grants are due at 4:00 p.m. on Thursday, August 29.





RTA Transit is the Answer Coalition Discusses Reforms

On July 31, the RTA Transit is the Answer Coalition met to discuss possible reforms that could improve service and accountability for riders. In the face of a looming \$730 million annual transit operating fiscal cliff, introduction of the Metropolitan Mobility Authority (MMA) Act, and ongoing Senate Transportation Committee hearings, the RTA has released its own potential reform ideas to build consensus. Reform suggestions include regional service standards, a regional fare policy, and capital project prioritization. Read more about these proposals at the <u>RTA Connections Blog</u>.

Regional Day Pass to Launch Later this Year

The Boards of Directors of the RTA, CTA, Metra, and Pace approved an agreement to launch a <u>Regional Day Pass pilot program</u> later this year. The Regional Day Pass will offer unlimited rides on CTA, Metra, and Pace. Weekday pricing will vary by Metra zone, between \$10 and \$16, and weekend pricing will be \$10 systemwide. Riders will be able to purchase this pass using the Ventra app once the vendor completes development and testing. The pilot will launch for six months and has the potential to become a permanent fare option if additional funding is secured.
