USDOT PROTECT Grants Make Transportation Infrastructure Resilient to Natural Hazards

The United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) has opened applications for the Promoting Resilient Operations for Transformative, Efficient, and Cost-Saving Transportation (PROTECT) Discretionary Grant Program. This program will offer \$576 million in FFY 2024-2025 for planning and construction of surface transportation facilities to be resilient to natural hazards such as climate change, flooding and extreme weather events. Fund Your Small-Scale Biking Projects with a Community Spark Grant

Whether you're developing a local traffic garden, creating a placemaking pop-up toolkit, installing bike racks, or your own creative idea, the League of American Bicyclists is offering communities the chance to implement projects and programs "that spark change and catalyze a community's ability to create places where bicycling is safer, easier, and more accessible" through Community Spark Grants. IEPA Electric Vehicle Rebate Program Now Open

For communities seeking to incentivize residents' adoption of electric vehicles, the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) will open its next all-electric vehicle rebate application cycle on Tuesday, January 21, with applications closing on Wednesday, April 30. Raise the Bar for Transportation Projects with a RAISE Grant

The USDOT has released its NOFO for the Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) Grant Program. This grant is available for planning or construction of surface transportation projects that will have a significant local or regional impact as well as advance the USDOT priorities of safety, equity, climate mitigation, sustainability, workforce development, job quality and wealth creation.

Capital projects must have a minimum cost of \$5 million, and projects in areas of persistent poverty historically disadvantaged or communities are eligible for up to 100% federal funding. Chicago Region Needs Input in the Safe Travel for All Safety Action Plan Process

As part of a regionwide initiative called Safe Travel for All, CMAP has partnered with Cook, DuPage, Kane, Lake, McHenry and Will Counties to develop and implement a Safety Action Plan for each county. The goal of these plans is to eliminate traffic fatalities and serious injuries in the region. Utilizing a nearly \$4 million federal Safe Streets and Roads for All grant, the counties will develop individualized safety action plans that will operate in a regional framework for future coordination. Next Round of Public Engagement for IDOT'S Long-Range Transportation Plan

IDOT has begun the next phase of Move Illinois: the 2024 Long-Range Transportation Plan. The plan will strategically outline goals, objectives and strategies for Illinois' diverse transportation network for the next 20 to 30 years. This is a multi-phase effort that will take place into 2025. The first phase of the plan was focused on transportation studies and public engagement to determine preferences for transportation goal areas. During the second phase, IDOT is focusing on potential actions and strategies to include in the plan. Residents are invited to provide feedback for the plan by filling out a survey and staying informed via the online meeting that can be found here. The project team works with residents, business owners and transportation professionals from across the state in an advisory group. This group combines the expertise transportation and information gathered from the community in each phase to help form the goals, objectives and strategies of the Long-Range Transportation Plan.
