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CMAP Releases Regional Transportation Priority Investment Project List

Chicago Metropolitan Agency The for Planning (CMAP) has released the Northeastern Illinois Priority Investments list, region's highlighting the highest-priority transportation projects for 2024. This blueprint is the result of collaboration between Department CMAP. the Illinois of Transportation (IDOT), the Chicago Department of Transportation (CDOT), the Regional Transportation Authority (RTA), the Chicago Transit Authority (CTA), Metra, Pace, the region's seven counties and the CREATE Program partners.

These projects will be funded with support from the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA). NWMC member area projects include the IDOT Regionwide Arterial Traffic Management Center in Schaumburg and members with Metra stations serving Chicago Station (Antioch, Bartlett, Buffalo Union Grove. Deerfield. Fox Lake, Glenview. Gravslake. Hanover Park, Lake Forest, Libertyville. Morton Grove. Mundelein. Northbrook, Prospect Heights, Schaumburg, Hills, Wheeling) Vernon will see improvements the Chicago with Hub Improvement Program.

FHWA Extends ATIIP Grant Deadline

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) announced it is extending the deadline for applications for the Active Transportation Infrastructure Investment Program (ATIIP). ATIIP grants allow communities to identify, prioritize and implement improvements to the largest barriers to safe, accessible and equitable pedestrian and bicycle network connectivity through the development of infrastructure that will provide substantial additional opportunities for walking and bicycling.

Communities can use ATIIP grants to create plans, implement an active transportation connection between communities, or connect active transportation facilities with transit services. Awards will range from \$100,000 up to \$15,000,000, with applications now due Wednesday, July 17. State Opens Funding for Downtown and Economic Recovery Grants

As a reminder, the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) recently announced \$20 million in funding under the Rebuild Downtowns & Main Streets (RDMS) program and \$10 million in funding for Research in Illinois to Spur Economic Recovery (RISE) Implementation Grants. RDMS funds support construction, repair, and modernization of infrastructure in downtown or commercial center areas of economic disinvestment. These projects can parking, include roads. public space park enhancements. investments. sustainability upgrades, structural repairs and mixed-use or transit-oriented development. RISE funds support water and sewer infrastructure, affordable local housing. workforce development. broadband. site preparation and other programs. Awards will range from \$250,000 to \$2,000,000 with a government 25% match required. local Applications are due by Monday, July 22. Interested parties can contact CEO.GrantHelp@illinois.gov. 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USDOT Now Accepting Applications for SMART Grants

The U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) is now accepting grant applications for Strengthening Mobility and Revolutionizing Transportation (SMART) Stage 1 Planning and FY2024. Prototyping projects for Transportation projects that use advanced data, technology, and applications to improve safety and reliability, resiliency, equity and public-private access, climate impacts, system integration are partnerships and eligible for these funds. Specifically, USDOT is looking for innovative projects in Coordinated Automation, Connected Vehicles, Intelligent, Sensor-Based Infrastructure, Systems Integration, Commerce Delivery and Logistics, Leveraging Use of Innovative Aviation Technology, Smart Grid Smart and Technology Traffic Signals. CMAP Releases Speed Management Report

CMAP recently issued the <u>Speed</u> <u>Management report</u> which explores factors that contribute to speed-related traffic safety risks and provides recommendations on road design, speed limit policy, education, and equitable enforcement. The report proposes that the region adopt the <u>Safe System</u> <u>Approach</u> to achieve <u>travel safety goals</u> <u>outlined in ON TO 2050</u>, the region's comprehensive plan.

The report also informs the region's safety action planning work by recommending roadway design and capacity guidance to reduce speeding and exposure to safety risks, reducing speed limits in urbanized areas where people walk, bike, and use transit, and supporting safe driving behavior with education and equitable enforcement. Learn How to Set Appropriate Speed Limits for All Road Users

FHWA has released a <u>video</u> on strategies and resources communities can use to set speed limits that are safe for all road users. FHWA Opens Round Two of the Charging and Fueling Infrastructure Grant Program

FHWA recently opened \$1.3 billion in funding through Round 2 of the Charging and Fueling Infrastructure (CFI) grant program. Community grants, focused on eliminating gaps in public EV charging infrastructure, will range from \$500,000 to \$15 million, with projects serving low- and moderate-income neighborhoods, communities with low ratio of private parking spaces to households, or high ratio of multiunit dwellings to single family homes will receive prioritization. Corridor grants, with a focus on EV and alternative infrastructure along designated fuelina corridors, will range from \$1 million with no maximum limit. Projects must demonstrate Justice40 benefits to communities and accessible and usable by individuals with disabilities. To learn more, visit the Grants.gov grant page or read the NOFO.
