# Join the Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee in Mount Prospect and Des Plaines at the Field Trip!

The NWMC Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee will be taking the show on the road again this summer when it visits *Mount Prospect* and *Des Plaines* for the Committee's annual Field Trip.

On Tuesday, June 10 at 10:00 a.m., participants will meet at Mount Prospect Village Hall and tour the recently completed Rand Road Sidepath. The leisurely roundtrip ride of about 9 miles will include stops along the way to learn about the sidepath's development and future connections. Lunch will be provided at Mount Prospect Village Hall while hearing about <u>Mount Prospect's</u> <u>Arterial Bike Network Study</u>.

#### Transit Governance and Funding Stalls Before Adjournment

In the final four days of the General Assembly's spring session, Sen. Ram. Villivalam amended <u>House Bill 3438</u> multiple times in an attempt to win support for transit governance changes and a comprehensive funding package. While the bill did pass the Senate shortly before midnight on May 31, the House did not call the bill for concurrence votes before adjourning.

Last week, both the House and the Senate introduced their transit proposals, which would replace the current Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) structure with the new Northern Illinois Transit Authority (NITA) and reconstitutes representation on the Metra, Pace and CTA boards. In the House, Senate Bill 2111 - House Amendment 1 (Rep. Eva-Dina Delgado), a bill that did not include new funding for transit, advanced out of the House Executive Committee on Thursday; however, the bill was never called for a vote on the House floor. As mentioned above, House Bill 3438 (Sen. Ram Villivalam) did include funding proposals and was approved in the Senate. Various funding proposals were included and then deleted from the multiple amendments in an effort to gain enough support in the Senate. The revenue package that ultimately passed the Senate included \$1.5 billion in revenues and efficiencies, most notably from a delivery fee ("environmental impact fee") and an expansion of the real estate transfer tax to suburban Cook County and the collar counties.

In his post-session press conference, Governor Pritzker said that, "I think there's significant work that will need to be done over the summer and in the fall," on transit reforms and funding (<u>Capitol Fax</u>). Because it is past May 31, any transit legislation that the General Assembly pursues over the summer or fall will require a three-fifths majority vote to become effectively immediately. The RTA has repeatedly highlighted that any new revenues must be implemented before the service board budgets are approved later this year in order to prevent service reductions in 2026.

# Implement Traffic Safety Interventions with Safe Streets for All Grants

With the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP) adoption of the region's county-level Safety Action Plans as part of its Safe Travel for All Roadmap (STAR) process on May 30, municipalities can now access nearly \$1 billion in <u>Safe Streets for All (SS4A)</u> <u>Planning and Implementation Grants and Demonstration Grants</u> under the <u>SS4A</u> <u>Federal Highway Administration (FWHA)</u> <u>NOFO</u>.

# Last Chance for IDOT's Call for Highway Safety Improvement Projects

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) has announced the <u>FY 2027 Local</u> <u>Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP)</u> call for projects. IDOT plans to allocate \$32.75 million to local agencies to support projects that reduce traffic fatalities and serious injuries, aligning with the national "moving toward zero" initiative.

This funding opportunity prioritizes projects addressing High Risk Rural Roads (HRRR) and Vulnerable Road Users (VRU), with a focus on systemic improvements like signage, pavement markings, and guardrail upgrades. Eligible projects can receive up to 90% federal funding support, with local agencies responsible for the remaining 10% match.

Local public agencies must submit detailed project information, including crash data, cost estimates, timelines, and narratives. Resources such as crash analysis tools and sample applications are available on <u>IDOT's</u> <u>HSIP website</u>. **IDOT encourages interested agencies to review the recording of its informational webinar to learn more about application best practices**. Applications are due by 5:00 p.m. on Friday, June 20.

# IDOT Soliciting Municipal Feedback on Active Transportation Strategies, Implementation Guide

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) is currently developing Walk Roll Illinois, the 2025 Illinois Active Transportation Plan and requests municipal feedback via this survey. Additionally, IDOT has created a draft Local Implementation Guide to assist "local agency partners who are working to enhance active transportation within their jurisdictions." IDOT also requests feedback on the guide to identify what will be most useful for Illinois communities. Assistance in sharing this survey with local transportation staff is appreciated.

#### Tap Into Those Unused Rebuild Illinois Funds Before They're Gone!

IDOT has notified communities that remaining Rebuild Illinois (RBI) funds can be retroactively applied to projects and substitute out utilized motor fuel taxes (MFT) as far back as 2019. IDOT only requires a community wanting to utilize RBI funds for a project to adopt a supporting resolution by Tuesday, July 1. For guidance on how to implement these funds, please see IDOT Circular Letter 2020-16.

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) recently announced project awards for Cycle 16 of the Illinois Transportation Enhancement Program (ITEP). Sixty-six projects totaling \$139.2 million received funding, including twelve projects in ten Northwest Municipal Conference member communities. # Submit Your Projects for the Transportation Resilience Improvement Plan

CMAP is soliciting transportation resilience projects to include in the Transportation Resilience Improvement Plan (TRIP) project The TRIP is intended to list. inform transportation planning and decision making. It will also position northeastern Illinois to better compete for federal investment opportunities, including the Federal Highway Administration's (FHWA) Promoting Resilient Operations for Transformative, Efficient, and Cost-Saving Transportation Discretionary Grant Program, which fund investments increased in transportation resilience to natural hazards.

To develop TRIP, CMAP assessed the climate risks to, and vulnerability of, the transportation Risk-based Vulnerability system. The Assessment found that flooding poses the biggest threat, impacting all transportation infrastructure, service operations, and users. Extreme heat and severe storms impact service operations and active transportation also posing а threat to rail users, infrastructure, electrical service, and backup power. The assessment data is available on CMAP's Data Hub and as a map to help identify projects, inform project selection, and incorporate into local planning activities.

#### NHTSA Updates Pedestrian/ Bicyclist Crash Typing Manual

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) released the 2023 FARS/CRSS Pedestrian Bicyclist Crash Typing Manual: A Guide for Coders Using the FARS/CRSS Ped/Bike Typing Tool, in order to help guide analysis of bicycle and pedestrian crashes and how to properly code procedures when using the Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS) and Crash Report Sampling System (CRSS). This system enables analysis of pre-crash actions and events involving drivers and pedestrians or bicyclists to explain the cause of crashes as well as provide standardized data and identify useful safety countermeasures.

#### Integrate Youth Perspectives in Transportation and Road Safety Campaigns

Vision Zero for Youth, a partner organization of the National Center for Safe Routes to School. has investigated three ways that municipalities are engaging youth: inviting youth to serve on local boards and commissions, creating youthonly boards that report to local government on various issues, and involving youth in specific community initiatives. These efforts focus in on transportation and safetv campaigns, identifying the different ways that both municipalities and youth participants can benefit from each other's experience. ### Communities Encouraged to Contribute to the Northeastern Illinois Development Database

From our partners at CMAP:

Our region is constantly changing, with some communities experiencing rapid growth, while others experience significant changes to land uses. Since 1987, the <u>Northeastern Illinois</u> <u>Development Database (NDD)</u> has tracked significant developments and redevelopments in the seven-county northeastern Illinois region.

Municipalities are encouraged to submit proposed, in-progress, or completed developments, contribute as all phases valuable data for the model. The NDD web map is an opportunity to ensure your community's growth is accurately represented in regional forecasts. The NDD web map is tailored for local government staff to actively participate in the forecasting process by submitting and editing developments. This data informs CMAP's local forecast model. which predicts household and job placements in developments across the region.
