# New Local STP Programs Approved for North Shore and Northwest Councils

Two new programs of Surface Transportation Program (STP) projects for the North Shore and Northwest Councils of Mayors were approved at CMAP's Board and MPO Policy Committee meeting on October 12. These programs are composed of five years of federal funding allocated the region and awarded to municipalities for important road, bridge, and intersection improvements.

Between the two councils, over \$49 million in funding was awarded for 36 new projects. Project types included both resurfacings and full reconstructions, intersection improvements and one grade separation. 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## Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee Learns About Safety Resources

At their October 18 meeting, the NWMC Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee met with Victoria Barrett, Transportation Planner with the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning, who provided an update on CMAP's Safety Resource Group. The update included an overview of regional traffic safety efforts, speed management strategies and bicycle and pedestrian safety. Ms. Barrett reported that CMAP had applied for funding through the federal Safe Streets for All program in order to help facilitate safety planning throughout the region. Committee members shared updates on local projects, including Hoffman Estates and Mount Prospect receiving Statewide Planning & Research grants.

# Tollway Seeks Comment on Tentative 2023 Budget

Last month, the Illinois Tollway introduced a Tentative 2023 Budget and is now seeking public comment on the spending plan. According to the tollway, the balanced budget includes \$426.5 million for annual maintenance and operations on the 294-mile system and provides funds to support \$1.47 billion in capital spending, including funding for the 12th year of the agency's 15-year, \$14 billion capital program entitled "Move Illinois: The Illinois Tollway Driving the Future."

As part of the Illinois Tollway's 2023 Budget process, the general public is invited to visit the Illinois Tollway's <u>website</u> to review the <u>Tentative</u> <u>2023 Budget Book</u> or view a recording of the <u>presentation</u> to the board. The public may also attend either of two hearings on Thursday, November 17, 9:00 a.m. at Illinois Tollway headquarters in Downers Grove or 6:00 p.m. at the Markham Village Hall, 16313 South Kedzie Parkway.

## NWMC Communities Participate in International Walk to School Day

On October 12 Illinois schools joined others throughout the world to celebrate International Walk to School Day. International Walk to School Day provides an opportunity for schools to ensure kids have safe routes to school and encourages students to improve their own health and the health of the environment by walking or rolling to school instead of traveling by private vehicles. Of the 122 Illinois schools participating in this annual event, 22 from 14 NWMC communities participated, including schools in Arlington Heights, Bartlett, Des Plaines, Evanston, Glenview, Hanover Park, Highland Park, Hoffman Estates, Kenilworth, Mount Prospect, Palatine, Schaumburg, Streamwood and Wilmette. # **IDOT Releases SMART & ATTAIN Grant NOFOs**

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) has announced a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for the Strengthening Mobility and Revolutionizing Transportation (SMART) and Advanced Transportation Technology and Innovation (ATTAIN) grants. SMART grants will offer up to \$100 million annually over the next five years for projects that use data and technology to solve real-world challenges facing communities today. ATTAIN grants will have \$60 available million to promote advanced technologies to improve safety and reduce travel times for drivers and transit riders and that can serve as national examples.

Public agencies interested in applying for SMART grants should submit application packages by 4:00 p.m. on Friday, November 18 via <u>Valid Eval</u>, an online submission proposal system used by USDOT. Public agencies interested in applying for ATTAIN grants should submit application packages by 10:59 p.m. on Friday, November 18, through <u>www.Grants.gov</u>.

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#### IDOT Announces Truck Access Route Program

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) is accepting applications for the \$7 million <u>Truck</u> <u>Access Route Program (TARP)</u>. Applications should include information pertaining to prior IDOT commitments, a description of industries, municipalities and truck generators along the proposed route, projected growth in the area and the number of trucks using the proposed route. Completed project applications and location maps should be submitted to the appropriate IDOT District Local Roads and Streets office no later than Monday, November 28. Project award notifications are anticipated to be announced during the week of December 19.

# New Data Available for Localized Greenhouse Gas Emissions

The Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP) has updated the <u>greenhouse gas</u> <u>emissions inventory</u>, which shows that between 2010 and 2019, overall emissions in northeastern Illinois decreased by 9 percent — or about 1 percent each year. While this is progress, CMAP notes that the region has a shared goal of reducing emissions by 5 percent annually through 2050.

While total emissions decreased, transportation emissions increased by 2 percent, showing the need for increased action in that sector. For the first time, CMAP released <u>individualized data</u> summaries by county, community and Chicago neighborhood that provide a snapshot of emissions from building, transportation and waste sectors. 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#### USDOT Launches New Thriving Communities Program

The U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) is seeking applications for its new Thriving Communities Program. The program will provide two years of technical assistance to communities that are under-resourced and disadvantaged, supporting them with developing and delivering projects that can encourage revitalization.

Nonprofits, state, local or tribal governments can apply now for the capacity builder portion of the program. Capacity builders can apply individually or as a team through Tuesday, November 22. Capacity builders funded through the program will assist selected communities with developing projects. Additionally, state, local, tribal governments, metropolitan planning organizations, and transit agencies are eligible to receive program assistance when applying with community partners. Groups can submit a letter of interest to participate in the Thriving Communities Program by Tuesday, December 6.
