Registration Open for CMAP's ADA and Accessibility Fall Training

The Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP) is offering a series of American With Disabilities Act (ADA) and accessibility training sessions this fall. The four sessions will be held on matters ranging from understanding responsibilities under the ADA and Title II of the Illinois Accessibility Code (**September 14**), ADA coordinator training (**October 11**), ADA self-evaluation (**November 8**) and ADA transition plans (**November 9**).

It is important to note that ADA Transition Plan status will be required in future funding program scoring methodologies. 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FTA Announces Pilot Program for Transit-Oriented Development Planning

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) has announced \$13.4 million in competitive grants through its Pilot Program for Transit-Oriented Development (TOD) planning program. Funding is available to integrate land use and transportation planning for new fixed guideway or core capacity transit project corridors. To apply for funding, an applicant must be an existing FTA grant recipient – either a project sponsor of an eligible transit project or an entity with land use planning authority in the project corridor. To ensure that work meets the needs of the local community, transit project sponsors and land use planning authorities must partner to conduct the planning work.

Pace Pulse Dempster Line Station Unveiled in Downtown Des Plaines

On August 9th, Pace unveiled the first Pulse Dempster Line station in downtown Des Plaines. The Pulse Dempster Line offers riders limited stop service between Evanston and Chicago's O'Hare International Airport while seamlessly connecting passengers to the CTA's Yellow and Purple lines in addition to Metra's Union Pacific North, Northwest and North Central Service corridors.

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Apply Today for Safe Routes to Schools Grants

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) is now accepting applications for the Safe Routes to School program. The program provides federal funding to improve safety and reduce traffic in areas around schools by supporting projects that make walking, biking and rolling to school a safe option for students. IDOT will distribute a total of \$6 million, with a maximum award of \$250,000. Projects may include new sidewalks, trafficcalming measures and improvements that increase accessibility for those with disabilities. Successful applications will demonstrate how the projects encourage students to walk, bike or roll.

Eligible applicants include school districts, local governments, planning organizations and nonprofit associations. Preference will be given to schools with higher percentages of low-income students and students with disabilities. The deadline to apply is Monday, **October 2**, with awards to be announced in the spring. RTA to Launch Expanded Transit Benefit Fare Program

Good news for commuters – starting next year, an expanded transit benefit program is coming to more workplaces than ever before. The Regional Transportation Authority (RTA) will launch the <u>Tran\$it Benefit Fare Program</u> in response to passage of the Transit Benefits Program Act that was signed last month by Governor Pritzker and will take effect on January 1, 2024. The Act will expand pre-tax benefits for both employers and employees to encourage the use of public transportation.

According to the RTA program, "employers with 50 or more full-time employees located within a mile of fixed-route transit service inside the six-county RTA region – such as a CTA or Metra station, as well as a CTA and Pace bus stops – will be required to offer their workers these new benefits. New hires will be eligible after 120 days of employment."

Employers can consult a <u>searchable map</u> to assist the business community in implementing the Transit Benefit Program Act.

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FHWA Publishes e-Bike Information Updates

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) recently published information on electric bicycles (e-bikes), including a literature review, fact sheet, research, and a series of case studies. According to the website, "Ebikes present an opportunity to reduce car travel, improve health, and increase access for all, especially traditionally underserved populations; however, the relationship between e-bikes and safety, infrastructure, equity, and the environment is not fully understood and remains of interest to decision makers and potential riders. The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) is advancing research on e-bikes to better understand ebike trends and impacts, and how jurisdictions around the country are managing them". Improving Pedestrian Safety on Urban Arterials Webinars

A recent Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) <u>Improving Pedestrian Safety on</u> <u>Urban Arterials: Learning from Australasia</u> <u>report</u> documents findings from a research team studying Australian and New Zealand approaches to reduce pedestrian fatalities and serious injuries on urban, signalized arterial roadways.

A <u>four-part webinar series</u> will share the results of the study, focusing on:

Panelists from FHWA, PedBikeInfo (PBIC), the USDOT Volpe National Transportation Systems Center, and agency representatives from the US, New Zealand, and Australia will describe how these approaches in policy, planning, and design may be applied to US arterials roadways.
