Skokie Receives MWRD Green Alleys Grant

The Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) has announced over \$1.1 billion in funding to address railroad crossing safety and efficiency through its Railroad Crossing Elimination (RCE) Grant Program. These funds can be used to build a grade separation or close off an at-grade crossing in addition to other safety enhancements. Applications are due Monday, September 30. Senate Committee Holds Fourth Hearing on the State of Public Transit

The Senate Transportation Committee held the fourth of six subject matter hearings on possible legislative actions to reform public transit on August 28 in Elgin. The subject of the hearing was how transit affects public health. Representatives of the Metro West Council of Governments and McHenry County Council of Governments along with leaders from Kane and McHenry counties provided testimony that highlighted the value of transit to their communities as well as the importance maintaining local representation of in governance. Hearings will continue through the fall, with the remaining schedule and topics as follows (locations to be determined):

Rebuild Those Old Bridges With an IDOT Bridge Grant!

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) has announced a special funding opportunity for the Illinois Special Bridge Program (ISBP), covering FY2030 local and state major highway bridges. Projects must have a minimum cost of \$1,000,000, with Construction and Construction Engineering phases eligible for grant funding. State bridges will be eligible if local communities accept a jurisdictional transfer. For more details on the program and how to apply, please see the <u>NOFO</u>. The United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) has announced the third round of funding for the Reconnecting Communities Pilot (RCP) Program, funded by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. Projects will reconnect communities by addressing transportation facilities that currently create barriers to community connectivity.

FHWA Toolkit Simplifies Bike Lane Planning

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) has issued a <u>Separated Bike Lanes on Higher</u> <u>Speed Roadways toolkit and guide</u> to assist in the planning, design and maintenance of these new facilities. The toolkit provides information on the current state of practice and challenges to implementation, as well as how to address driver behavior, bicyclist safety and varying comfort levels of cyclists.

NHTSA Releases Bike and Ped Crash Safety Facts

Highway Traffic The National Safetv Administration (NHTSA) has released its 2022 Traffic Safety Facts report on Bicyclists and Other Cyclists and Pedestrian report. The reports show that from 2021 to 2022, there was a 13 percent increase in bicyclist fatalities in traffic crashes and an 11 percent increase in injuries. Additionally, 29 percent of crashes involving bicyclists occurred at intersections. There was also a 0.7 percent increase in pedestrian fatalities, the highest number since 1984, with pedestrian deaths now accounting for 18 percent of all traffic fatalities. Children 14 and younger track this national average, with children walking accounting for 17 percent of the age group's traffic fatalities. Additional details, including day of week, time of day, type of vehicle, location of initial point of impact on vehicle, alcohol usage, and state, as well as safety reminders, are included in the reports.

Safe Routes to Schools Partnership Releases State Report Card; Illinois is Making Strides!

The Safe Routes to Schools Partnership has just released its 2024 state report card, providing a snapshot of how each state supports walking, bicycling, and physical activity for children and adults. Illinois was rated Making Strides, the second-best ranking, due to the state's excelling at federal and state active transportation funding, use of Safe Routes to Schools funding, and Safe Routes to School supportive practices. Illinois is only Lacing Up, however, the lowest ranking, in adoption of active transportation goals and school siting and design standards. Complete the "My Daily Travel Survey" This Fall

The Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP) is launching a major survey called <u>My Daily Travel</u> this fall to better understand the travel needs of residents in northeastern Illinois. As travel behaviors change and technologies evolve over the next few years, transportation planners will use this survey data to guide future transportation investments and prioritize improvements.

Through Spring 2025, at least 4,000 households in northeastern Illinois are expected to participate in the survey either online, over the phone, or through a smartphone app (rMoveTM). Households will receive an invitation by U.S. mail and are strongly encouraged to complete the survey and help plan a transportation system that meets their needs. Participants who complete the survey will receive a gift card for their time.
