Call to Order/Introductions

Trustee Porter called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m.

Approval of January 9, 2024 Meeting Minutes

Trustee Buehler moved approval of the January 9, 2024 meeting minutes. Mr. Mangum seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

III. Safe Travel for All Roadmap (STAR)

Ms. Bayley presented on the <u>Safe Travel for All Roadmap (STAR</u>). STAR was created to address increasing numbers of roadway deaths, with people cycling and walking representing an increasing number. Ms. Bayley highlighted the growing size of vehicles, greater speed increasing risk and decreasing safety to people cycling and walking. STAR will provide a framework for safety research and programs within northeastern Illinois, with a focus on Safe Roads and Safe Road Users, including use of speed cameras to create behavior change.

Mr. Mangum asked whether Safe Streets for All (SS4A) grants require having a plan to apply for infrastructure funding and whether the CMAP safety plan will cover that requirement. Ms. Bayley confirmed the CMAP safety plan would cover roadways of all jurisdictions. Ms. Bayley added that the real challenge will be getting the draft CMAP plan in place before funding ends as a change in White House leadership would mean loss of the funding program.

Mr. Tomzik asked whether CMAP included research on the safety effects of red light cameras. Ms. Bayley responded that there was no research on red light cameras for the STAR paper. However, she had reviewed evidence there was an increase in rear end crashes but a decrease in more fatal/serious injury perpendicular crashes.

Ms. Bayley offered to send out the STAR presentation.

Mr. Larson shared a recent University of Nebraska EV crash test video that related to the increasing vehicle size discussed by Ms. Bayley.

Trustee Porter asked whether there was any information on the relative cost of speed or red light camera programs. Ms. Bayley said she would share USDOT planning for camera systems document, but is unsure whether it includes costs. Mr. Larson said he could look into NWMC community usage and costs. Mr. Mangum added that only certain municipalities are allowed to implement red light and speed cameras. Ms. Bayley said she would need to look into which policies are required for wider implementation. Mr. Czarnota added that license plate readers are in place in some NWMC communities, but he is unsure whether the same requirements apply to red light cameras.

Ms. Bayley clarified that speed impact signs have an impact on speeding.

Mr. Dorsey shared that police are reluctant to enforce speeding laws unless the behavior is substantially above the speed limit, such as greater than 20MPH, in Cook County due to dismissive judges. Ms. Bayley said rural location police have expressed a similar reluctance to pull over drivers, as many roads that lack shoulders, which exposes police officers to the danger of inattentive drivers.

IV. Other Business

Mr. Larson shared the results of an analysis of the status of the NWMC Multimodal Plan Priority Corridors. The analysis showed that there are several corridors that are either completely built or planned out and several with significant nonexisting segments that also constitute a large amount of nonexisting mileage. Mr. Larson also shared how the corridor completion rate breaks down by community by percentage and mileage, and that NWMC will be organizing a future talking session among communities with both substantial and lower completion rates to identify best practices, common barriers, and ways to target funding and technical assistance.

Mr. Foreman shared that Mount Prospect has begun an <u>Arterial Bike Network Study</u>. The municipality is focusing on intersections and crossings at intersections. As part of the Study, Mount Prospect is hosting an open house on February 21, from 5-7 p.m.

V. Next Meeting

The next meeting of the NWMC Bicycle and Pedestrian Committee is scheduled for Tuesday, March 12 at 10:30 a.m. in person at the NWMC offices or virtually via Zoom.

Mr. Buehler moved to adjourn the meeting at 11:13 a.m. *Mr.* O'Brien seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

The purpose of this plan is to provide guidance where the Village could invest in improved walking and bicycling infrastructure, and on which policies and procedures could support these investments. The plan outlines approximate spending priorities for a 20-year period, and will be reviewed regularly to identify when updates are needed.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Village of Glenview Bicycle and Pedestrian Plan serves as a document to guide investment in capital infrastructure and policies and programs to support and encourage walking and bicycling in the Village. This plan builds upon previous iterations of the plan and lays out a 20-year vision. The previous plan, approved in 2007, helped to spur over 13 miles of sidewalk, multi-use path, and bicycle lane projects.

The first phase of investment is anticipated for completion within a five-year period. Phases 2 and 3 show proposed investments for years 6-20.



The **Public Engagement** section summarizes the importance of the engagement activities commenced during the planning process. Through various engagement activities, including bicycle and walking tours, an open house, and a public survey, the Plan was powerfully informed by diverse voices and opinions, aligning it closely with the actual needs and desires of those who call the Village home.

The **Design Guidance** component of the Plan reflects a planning process focused on integrating national design guides to enhance safety and provide a versatile toolkit for the Village's future projects. The resulting design principles, meticulously outlined within the guidance, encompass a spectrum of criteria governing the evolution of off-street connections.

The **Proposed Network** focused intently on establishing off-street connections to nearby regional trails. The network lays the foundation for a cohesive and accessible pathway framework, fostering active lifestyles and reinforcing the Village's identity as an interconnected, vibrant community.

The **Policies & Programs** proposed within the Plan are vital to catalyzing transformative change through non-infrastructure initiatives. These sections address the community's needs beyond physical infrastructure, creating a holistic approach to sustainable mobility.

The **Funding & Implementation** phases were structured to align with the Village's financial capacities and administrative framework while addressing the preferences and requirements of the local populace.

625 ILCS 5/11-315

Synopsis As Introduced

Amends the Illinois Vehicle Code. Provides that the authority having maintenance jurisdiction over publicly owned paved bicycle trails in the State shall erect permanent regulatory or warning signage alerting pedestrians or cyclists of highway crossings, unless the intersection where the trail crosses the highway is controlled by an official traffic control device or sign. Provides that if the authority having maintenance jurisdiction over publicly owned bicycle trails has actual knowledge of an emergency or safety hazard that creates a dangerous condition on a publicly owned paved bicycle trail, the authority shall take reasonable steps to erect temporary signage or other warning markers, including, but not limited to, cones, barricades, or drums, alerting pedestrians or cyclists of the dangerous condition. Makes other changes.
