I. Call to Order

President Darch called the meeting to order at 8:30 a.m., and asked those present to provide introductions.

II. Approval of January 28, 2022 Meeting Minutes

Ms. Caddigan moved approval of the January 28, 2022 meeting minutes. Mayor Hayes seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

III. Agency Reports

a. CMAP Report

Mr. Pietrowiak referred the committee to the written report provided and noted that CMAP hired several new staff members, including a new position specifically focused on ADA transition planning. He shared information regarding ADA transition plan requirements and the general timeline for enforcement. Mr. Pietrowiak reported on new federal funding coming to the region and the importance of meeting new goals in the programs and as well as schedule and obligation goals. He noted that the ON TO 2050 plan would be updated and open to public comment this summer. Mr. Ottesen asked whether the ADA requirements would only impact communities that are not in compliance, or if they would have an impact on the larger region. Mr. Pietrowiak explained that the region could be impacted in that it has to show collective progress towards the requirements, but in the meantime individual communities will not be impacted in terms of funding eligibility. He noted that CMAP will be putting resources toward helping communities comply with the requirements. Mr. Townsend asked about possible increases in federal funding and whether the allocations to the councils would be increased. Mr. Pietrowiak responded that the increase has already been distributed to the councils. Ms. Johnson confirmed that the funding levels included in the new STP program spreadsheet were updated with the increases. Mr. Townsend asked for clarification on whether the marks could change at a later date, and Mr. Pietrowiak confirmed that there could be changes, but no major changes were anticipated.

b. IDOT Highways

Written report provided.

c. IDOT Local Roads

Mr. Househ referred to the attached local roads status sheets and noted several projects that were targeting the June letting and those that had recent schedule changes.

d. Illinois Tollway

Written report provided.

e. Cook County Department of Transportation and Highways

Ms. Diaz referred to the written report provided and requested feedback on the accuracy of the report if needed. She noted three projects that will likely be removed due to impending close out. Ms. Diaz reported that the Department has had some staff turnover and some projects will transition to new project managers. Ms. Diaz reported that the County was developing a new transit plan and has published short online survey as part of the process. She encouraged the Committee to take the survey and share it with others. Finally, she thanked those who applied for the Invest in Cook program and noted staff were currently evaluating applications.

f. Metra

Ms. Renteria reported that Metra would be expanding the schedule of the UP-Northwest and UP-North lines. She requested feedback from affected communities so that they can continue to refine the schedules. She reported that ridership grew to approximately 35% of pre-pandemic ridership as of April 21. Ms. Renteria reported that new ticket vending machines would start to be installed at stations, beginning with the concrete pads for the vending machine sites. She provided an update on the Kansas City Southern and Canadian Pacific merger, which Metra has expressed concerns about in terms of the effect it could have on service and track conditions. Mayor Hayes noted his disappointment with the new UP-NW service, in particular the changes in express service that negatively impact riders from Arlington Heights. Mayor Hayes noted that he has already begun a dialogue with other Metra staff and expressed appreciation for their willingness to work with the Village to take their feedback into account.

g. Pace

Mr. Andrews reported an increase in ridership to 22 percent of pre-pandemic levels as of March. He announced that new paratransit vehicles were recently delivered and would be going into service over the next few months. He reported that Pace has ordered 20 new electric buses as part of their transition to a zero emissions fleet. Mr. Andrews provided an update on the construction of the Pace Pulse Dempster line which will continue throughout the year. He reported that the Northwest Transportation Center expansion in Schaumburg is scheduled to break ground this year and the Wheeling facility is currently in the procurement phase for construction. Finally, Mr. Andrews noted continued issues in hiring bus operators, but that there has been steady progress and their efforts were ongoing.

h. RTA

Written report provided.

IV. Northwest Council of Mayors Proposed FFY 2023-2027 STP-L Program

Ms. Johnson presented the draft recommended program for federal fiscal years 2023-2025 of the Northwest Council of Mayors' local Surface Transportation Program. She provided an overview of the timeline and required steps for final approval by the Northwest Council of Mayors. She noted that scoring documentation was available for specific questions. Mr. Ottesen requested that Ms. Johnson send the scoring documentation as a follow up so that the Committee could review the list of projects in more detail. He noted his concern with the amount of projects that were simple resurfacing projects versus larger capacity enhancing or grade separation projects. He suggested possibly lifting the maximum per project cap to address this issue. President Darch noted the program included the increased marks that were mentioned at the beginning of the meeting. Mr. Townsend noted that the length of the proposed contingency program illustrates the need for investment in the region and requested that CMAP and other agencies keep this in mind as opportunities for additional funding become available. Mr. Pietrowiak responded that there will be significant opportunities through competitive programs from the infrastructure bill and that CMAP will be advocates for regional projects. Mr. Townsend asked for CMAP to further advocate for increased flexibility in leveraging federal funds as matching sources, and Mr. Pietrowiak noted that CMAP is looking into ways that municipalities can better leverage funding.

Mr. Bragg moved approval of the release of the draft STP program for public comment. Mr. Cassady seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

V. Northwest Council Surface Transportation Program

a. Current Program Update

Ms. Johnson provided an update on the council's current STP program, noting changes since the January meeting.

b. Cost Increase Request – Village of Schaumburg

The Village of Schaumburg requested an increase of \$842,879 for CON in FFY 2022 for the National Parkway reconstruction project.

Mr. Cassady moved approval of a partial increase of \$366,662 for the Village of Schaumburg's request. *Mr.* Bragg seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

c. Cost Increase Request – Village of Streamwood

The Village of Streamwood requested an increase of \$34,765 for ENG II in FFY 2022 for the IL 19/Bartlett Road project.

Mr. Townsend moved approval of a partial increase of \$24,235 for the Village of Streamwood. *Mr.* Cassady seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

d. Cost Increase Request – Village of Buffalo Grove

The Village of Buffalo Grove requested an increase of \$201,584 for ENG II in FFY 2022 for the Bernard Drive project.

Ms. Johnson explained the reasoning for staff's recommendation to defer the request, referring to the Council's prioritization requirements. Mr. Bragg explained the importance of the project and requested consideration of the Village's request in the future should funding become available. Mr. Ottesen requested more information on the ranking and scoring information in the future when considering cost increases. Ms. Johnson noted that she would provide the information moving forward and that the current format does show project in rank order. President Darch noted that the Council would be open to reconsidering the request should the opportunity present itself.

e. Approval of Current Program

Mayor Hayes moved approval of the current program, including cost changes addressed in Item V. Ms. Caddigan seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

Mr. Ottesen expressed his appreciation for Mr. Househ's assistance in helping several projects move through the review process to maintain schedules and adhere to Active Program Management requirements. Ms. Caddigan noted concerns with the impact that delays were having on current and future projects and municipalities' ability to obligate funding and implement projects. Mr. Pietrowiak reported that CMAP has had discussions with IDOT regarding these issues and that significant improvements were being made in invoice processing, and that the agreement review and cultural/environmental reviews would be the next focus. Mr. Househ confirmed that certain procedures were being changed to streamline the process.

VI. City of Rolling Meadows Functional Class Change Requests

Ms. Johnson presented two functional classification change requests submitted by the City of Rolling Meadows.

Mr. Ottesen expressed concern with the low score for the Campbell Street application and the possibility of establishing a minimum score or criteria for functional classifications. Ms. Caddigan asked if there is a threshold for requests currently. Ms. Johnson confirmed that there was no minimum score threshold for the current scoring. Mr. Ottesen suggested approving the Rohlwing Road application and having Campbell Street's request deferred until the Committee could review additional information regarding their request. Mr. Cassady further requested that future functional classification requests be accompanied by more detailed information regarding their application and scoring.

Mr. Ottesen moved approval of the functional classification request for Rohlwing Road and deferral of Campbell Street's request. Ms. Caddigan seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

Ms. Charlton explained that the Rohlwing Road application was a necessary step in order to submit Campbell Street's request. She noted the potential for the road segment to be an alternative route in the area in anticipation of the Chicago Bears' relocation to the Arlington Park complex. She said she could follow up with additional information on the applications if needed.

VII. Other Business

Ms. Johnson noted that she received several requests during the call for projects process to reevaluate the Complete Streets scoring category and that this could be a good opportunity to revisit the functional classification scoring as well as the maximum per project funding cap. She explained that she would reach out municipal staff to form a working group to discuss the issues.

VIII. Next Meeting

The committee scheduled the next regular meeting of the Northwest Council of Mayors Technical Committee for Friday, July 15 at 8:30 a.m. at the Barrington Village Hall.

IX. Adjourn

Mr. Bragg moved adjournment of the meeting at 9:30 a.m. *Mr.* Townsend seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

Program Status Updates

CRRSAA Program

On December 27, 2020, Title IV of the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2021 (CRRSAA) was enacted. This Act included a local government component that resulted in the allocation of \$42,647,247 to be programmed and managed by CMAP. In the fall of 2021, the STP Project Selection Committee and local councils of mayors selected <u>33 individual project phases</u> to be fully or partially funded with CRRSAA funding. The <u>Regional CRRSAA Program Status Report</u> and <u>Regional CRRSAA Accounting Summary</u> were updated in June 2022.

Regional Safety Action Agenda

CMAP is continuing its work to improve traffic safety and address the growing number of fatalities and injuries. Staff is wrapping up a policy paper on speed management and continuing work on a bicycle and pedestrian safety policy paper. Our Safety Resource Group will meet early this summer to discuss implementation of the recommendations for speed management and initial bicycle and pedestrian safety policy recommendations. Three Local Technical Assistance safety projects are wrapping up in Calumet City, Bellwood and Riverdale, which will result in Safety Action Plans for each community, so that they can apply for implementation funding. The Regional Speed Data project is underway; speed data providers are currently submitting qualifications for consideration. This project will analyze speed probe data to understand patterns of speeding and target appropriate countermeasures to curb it. Staff is closely monitoring safety-related programs enabled by IIJA, including the Safe Streets for All funding opportunity to position our region to take advantage of these safety dollars.

Metra Super Saver Pass

Metra is now offering a \$100 "Super Saver" monthly pass that allows for unlimited travel anywhere in the system. Discounted passes are available for eligible seniors and K-12 students. Thanks to the Fair Transit South Cook Pilot, riders on the Metra Electric and Rock Island lines will pay a reduced fare of \$70. The Super Saver pass can be purchased from any ticket agent or on the Ventra app. Additional information as well as details on the Regional Connect Pass and Metra Family Fares programs can be found <u>here</u>.

Equitable Transit-Oriented Development

Transit connects people to opportunities, but just 21 percent of the region's jobs and 8 percent of its population are located within a quarter mile of rapid transit. Equitable transit-oriented development (ETOD) strategies aim to enhance economic development and provide better access to transit and jobs. On Tuesday, May 24, <u>Metropolitan Planning Council</u> and the <u>Center for Neighborhood Technology</u> demonstrated an <u>online calculator</u> they created, which provides data and information for policymakers and developers to explore the benefits of ETOD. RTA Launches Online Portal for Reduced, Free Ride Permits

The RTA launched Fare Programs Online, a web-based portal for reduced fare and ride free permits for seniors and customers with disabilities. The portal aims to increase access to these programs. Apply, replace, and renew at <u>Fares.RTAChicago.org</u>.

Funding Opportunities

Safe Streets and Roads for All

Local, county, and regional governments can apply for \$1 billion in grant funding for federal fiscal year 2022 under the <u>Safe Streets and Roads for All program</u>. The program supports projects that can address the national roadway safety crisis. Grant funding can help governments develop comprehensive safety plans and implement strategies that can improve the safety of all travelers. Final applications are due **Thursday, September 15.**

Bridge Investment Program

FHWA is accepting applications for the <u>Bridge Investment Program</u>, which helps replace, rehabilitate, and preserve the nation's bridges. More than \$2.4 billion in grant funding is available for federal fiscal year 2022. The program also expands the list of eligible applicants to include all levels of government.

Applications for large bridge projects (eligible costs more than \$100 million) are due **Tuesday, August 9**, **2022.** Applications for smaller projects (less than \$100 million) are due **Thursday, September 8**, **2022.**

Railroad Crossing Safety Program (Section 130)

The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) is accepting applications for FY2023 and FY2024 Highway Grade Crossing Safety Program projects to be funded with Federal Section 130 Funds. IDOT continues to place a strong emphasis on crossing closure, warning device, and circuitry related projects, as opposed to crossing surface and roadway approach projects. The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act increased the federal share for portions of the to 100 percent. This important change means there will be no local funding match requirements for new projects. All local agency projects (non-railroad work) using Section 130 funds (in part or in whole) must be placed on a State Letting.

Applications are due by July 29, 2022. More information can be found in Circular Letter 2022-16.

U.S. DOT Reconnecting Communities Pilot Program – Planning and Capital Construction Grants

Over \$1 billion is available from U.S. DOT over the next five years to support planning, capital construction, and technical assistance to equitably and safely restore community connectivity through the removal, retrofit, mitigation, or replacement of eligible transportation infrastructure facilities that create barriers to mobility, assess, or economic development. A Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) is expected this summer. Quarterly status updates are due for all projects funded with **STP-Local**, **STP-Shared Fund**, **CRRSAA-Local**, **CMAQ**, **and/or TAP-Local** projects, all STP-L, STP-SF, and/or CRRSAA-L contingency projects, and all deferred CMAQ or TAP-L projects. Failure to submit quarterly status updates for STP or CRRSAA funded projects may result in removal of all programmed funding in current and out years of the program and/or removal from the contingency program. STP-Shared Fund, CMAQ, and TAP-L updates should be emailed to <u>transportation@cmap.illinois.gov</u>. STP-L and CRRSAA-L updates should be emailed to your council planning liaison.

Summer Travel Message

Now that the summer travel season has begun, Illinois Tollway drivers continue to have the option to pay tolls with I-PASS, E-ZPass or pay online with the Tollway's Pay By Plate service. And for those in need of assistance, the Tollway has enhanced it's I-PASS Assist program.

Here's what customers need to know:

- Take your transponder. I-PASS can be used to pay tolls on the Illinois Tollway system and in other states that accept E-ZPass, including 19 other states that are part of the <u>E-ZPass network</u>.
- **Pay tolls online.** All drivers have a 14-day grace period to pay unpaid tolls. The <u>Pay By</u> <u>Plate</u> service allows customers to simply provide a license plate, dates of travel, and a payment method and then the Illinois Tollway will take care of the rest.
- Get assistance to join I-PASS. Customers unable to use I-PASS for financial reasons have more benefits than ever with the <u>Tollway's I-PASS Assist</u> program, including no deposit, lower pre-paid balance requirements and dismissal of invoice fees for accounts in good standing.

Work Zones

Whenever possible, the Tollway uses traffic shifts and shoulders to keep as many lanes open during peak hours as were available before construction. However, at times lane closures are necessary to provide a work zone and safely accommodate traffic. Electronic message signs and construction signage will be put in place in advance to alert drivers to scheduled lane closures, traffic patterns and work zone speed limits.

Work zone speed limits are in effect in all construction zones 24/7 and drivers should continue to watch for changing traffic patterns and use caution, especially when workers are present.

Areas where ongoing work zones may impact traffic include:

Tri-State Tollway (I-94/I-294/I-80)

- On I-94, traffic shifts in both directions between Half Day Road and Atkinson Road.
- On I-294 between the O'Hare Oasis and 95th Street, traffic shifts in both directions with counterflow lanes throughout the Central Tri-State corridor. Watch for signage indicating changing traffic patterns.
- On I-294, the ramp from eastbound Archer Avenue to southbound I-294 is closed and a detour is posted.
- On I-294, the ramps from northbound I-294 to Wolf Rd and to southbound I-55 are closed and detours are posted.

Dial *999 for Roadway Assistance

Drivers should call *999 to get help from Tollway roadway maintenance crews or from Illinois State Police District 15 who patrol the Tollway system 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Motorist aid patrols stand ready to help stranded customers change tires, jump-start batteries, add coolant, dispense fuel, transport customers, move vehicles away from traffic and call for a tow truck.

The June 2022 issue of the Pulse Newsletter is now available online. Find it <u>here</u> and see the latest news on the Dempster, Halsted, and 95th Street Lines.

Pace is holding virtual public hearings on the proposed implementation of the Pulse Dempster Line and changes to Route 250 – Dempster Street. The Pulse Dempster Line is a rapid transit bus service in development that is proposed to offer faster, more frequent, limited-stop bus service every day, primarily along Dempster Street, between the CTA Purple Line Davis Street Station in Evanston and the O'Hare Multi-Modal Facility (MMF) in Chicago. Pulse will serve new stations with passenger amenities along the Line.

With the improved service levels proposed on the Pulse Dempster Line, Pace is also proposing to reduce Weekday, Saturday, and Sunday service on Route 250 – Dempster Street, which would continue to operate primarily along Dempster Street between the CTA Purple Line Davis Street Station in Evanston and the O'Hare Multi-Modal Facility (MMF) in Chicago.

Kwasneski Reappointed to Fifth Term as Pace Board Chairman

Rick Kwasneski has been reappointed to serve a fifth four-year term as Chairman of the Pace Board of Directors, gathering unanimous support from the elected County Board officials charged with the selection process. Kwasneski has served as Pace Chairman since 2006, and prior to that served on the Board as the director representing Southwest Cook County dating to 2002. He served the Village of Lemont as Mayor and Trustee from 1985 to 2001.

"I'm honored and humbled to accept this reappointment to the chairmanship of Pace," said Kwasneski. "We have more work to do to improve suburban transit and with the help of my colleagues on the Board of Directors and Pace staff, we'll rise to the challenge of ensuring our service meets the needs of northeastern Illinois commuters and businesses in the years ahead."

Throughout his tenure with Pace, Kwasneski has advocated for Pace passengers, especially passengers with disabilities. "Making sure we are innovative and implementing the appropriate technology to enhance our ADA paratransit passengers' experience is important to me," he said. "I will continue to advocate for the resources we need to provide this essential service."

Kwasneski went on to say, "This is a very exciting time for Pace. We are focusing on pandemic recovery, meeting our goal of zero emissions by 2040, and implementing the largest capital program in our agency's history. Meeting the diverse and critical needs of our passengers will be instrumental in our region's economic recovery."

By law, the Chairman of the Pace Board is appointed by a majority of the suburban members of the Cook County Board of Commissioners and the county board chairs from Lake, McHenry, Kane, DuPage, and Will counties.

"As chairman of the Cook County Commissioners Suburban Caucus, I was proud to support Rick Kwasneski for reappointment to his fifth term as Pace Chairman," said Cook County Commissioner Peter Silvestri. "He has provided exceptional leadership over the years and is the right person to guide Pace moving forward."

"While Rick has provided steady, sound leadership for 16 years, his stewardship during the pandemic's three years has been essential to keeping Pace a key part of our economic recovery," said Cook County Commissioner Larry Suffredin.

Pace has enjoyed numerous successes during Kwasneski's tenure, among them the successful restructuring of South Cook & Will County service, the launch of Bus on



Shoulder service along I-55, the launch of Pace's largest ever service expansion along the I-90 corridor, coordination of dial-a-ride services to allow travel across local boundaries, and the realization of Pace's first rapid bus transit service, the Pulse Milwaukee Line.

"I have worked with Rick Kwasneski for many years," said Will County Executive Jennifer Bertino-Tarrant. "Rick and Pace have been great partners in providing innovative transportation options for the residents of Will County. I look forward to continuing our partnership over the next four years."

"For more than 20 years, Rick Kwasneski has worked to understand and meet the transportation needs of those we serve," said DuPage County Chairman Dan Cronin. "I'm pleased to vote in favor of his reappointment as Chairman of the Pace Board of Directors and look forward to our continued work to improve the quality of life for DuPage County residents."

Kwasneski's leadership and influence over the public transit industry has expanded beyond Pace's six-county service area as well. In October 2021, he was appointed to the American Public Transportation Association (APTA) Executive Committee. As one of only 24 national transit leaders selected to serve on this body, he works with transportation agencies and companies across the country to advance the needs of Pace and the industry. In this role, he is able to advocate for Pace's interests in the national discussion on infrastructure while bringing the nation's best public transportation practices back to our region.
