I. Call to Order

Mayor Johnson called the meeting to order at 8:33 am.

II. Approval of December 20, 2024 Meeting Minutes

Mayor McLeod moved approval of the December 20, 2024 meeting minutes. Mayor Sanoica seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

III. Agency Reports

a. CMAP

Written report provided.

b. Cook County Department of Transportation and Highways

Mr. Ruehle introduced himself as the new representative from Cook County Department of Transportation and Highways. He reported that the Invest in Cook grant program is currently open for applications with \$85 million to assist transportation projects.

c. IDOT Highways

No report.

d. IDOT Local Roads

Written report provided.

e. Illinois Tollway

Ms. Passi reported that the Tollway has begun its capital planning process and is currently requesting regional input. She noted that as part of this effort, the Tollway's Stakeholder Advisory Group reported its areas of interest in December. Ms. Passi added that Tollway will be rolling out its Bridging the Future program to cover periods between this and future capital plans to connect infrastructure, improve mobility, and repair the system for tomorrow's needs.

f. Metra

No report.

g. Pace

Ms. Rybarczyk reported that Pace's ReVision process would reimagine suburban transit services, which currently includes three network concepts, which are not formal plans. Ms. Rybarczyk thanked communities for their input to date, noting that the deadline for public comment on the current phase is Friday, January 24. She said that once the concept phase ends, Pace will move to create and release draft plans in Summer 2025. She encouraged communities to continue to reach out during this process. She said a final implementation plan would be developed afterwards, and that Pace is coordinating with Metra and CTA to ensure Pace's plan is matching those of the other service boards.

Ms. Rybarczyk noted that Pace supports a stronger RTA which increases coordination on things like fare systems but disagrees that the MMA proposal will have positive impact on rider experiences. She added that Pace strongly believes the Plus 50 transformation will be best for the region.

h. RTA

Ms. Johnson reported that in addition to the written report provided, RTA has approved its 5-year capital program.

V. RTA's Transforming Transit Proposal

Mr. Nash presented <u>RTA's "Transforming Transit"</u> proposal. He said that the transit fiscal cliff creating a 20% operating budget gap would mean a 40% reduction in service. He said that the RTA agrees that funding must come with reforms including increased efficiency, transparency, accountability, integrated fares, improved customer service, service standards, and capital project prioritization. Mr. Nash said a reformed RTA could enable more proactive oversight and review of service board decisions to ensure efficient operations throughout the year, whereas the current system generally only permits an annual review.

Mr. Nash reported that RTA's proposal would increase revenue by \$100 million through fare increases, non-farebox revenue, efficiencies and savings. He added that the Transit is the Answer Coalition will meet on Tuesday, February 11 to review the proposal and move forward on the advocacy campaign. Mr. Nash noted that the RTA budget process begins mid-May, just before the adjournment of the General Assembly, and due to the interaction between local, state, and federal transit requirements, RTA needs certainty by that time on funding, otherwise reductions will be based on what RTA knows to be available.

Mayor Johnson asked whether there will there be collaboration on advocacy in Springfield for law enforcement safety efforts with local authorities to highlight similar concerns. Mr. Nash replied that the RTA strongly supports providing resources to local law enforcement agencies.

Mayor Johnson asked whether RTA is seeking strategic support from federal partners. Mr. Nash replied that while RTA is working with federal partners, federal funding for operations has not been available since the 1980s. He said that most federal funds consist of formula programs and grants, so any awards that have been issued and in hand are beyond reach, but future funding flows may not continue as initially thought.

Mayor Johnson asked if the technical limitations of service providers are considered regarding efficiency, commuter experiences, and apps. Mr. Nash replied that the current Ventra contract is held at the CTA level even though all providers rely upon it, so the goal of greater accountability means more service reliability, and greater regional streamlining.

Mr. Cole asked whether the RTA proposal has the support of CTA, Metra, and Pace. Mr. Nash replied that different proposals from the agencies are likely, but the RTA was asked by the Governor, General Assembly, and RTA Board to provide their vision, and the RTA has a fair degree of confidence they can reach consensus with the service boards.

Mr. Cole asked whether the expectation with the RTA's proposal is that facilities, vehicles, and apps would have RTA branding instead of the current service boards. Mr. Nash replied that daily operations will remain with service boards, but administrative, managerial, financial, and information sharing will be at the regional level to coordinate the user experience.

Ms. FioRito asked how the proposal addresses existing transit service's lack of connectivity and separate planning participation and boards. Mr. Nash responded that the proposal places more accountability on a single agency. He noted that under the current budgeting, RTA offers funding amount to the agencies, and the agency comes back with what service they can provide.

Ms. FioRito asked whether planning would continue to be done separately or be managed as a cohesive process. Mr. Nash replied that providing multiple opportunities for the RTA to engage on service performance allows for intervention to address lack of collaboration. He noted that the proposal does not recommend RTA taking over service planning from operators, and that the RTA currently only looks backwards, and wants to be more proactive. Ms. FioRito encouraged greater transit system cohesion due to the variability of service.

Mayor Johnson requested an analysis of consolidation and coordination, and how each results in fiscal stability, efficiency, and other factors.

Mayor Sanoica asked how the RTA's proposal affects paratransit services and its relationship with townships and local governments. Mr. Nash replied that paratransit services are a federal and state mandate, but door-to-door services are only within ¾ mile of fixed-routes. He said that paratransit gets first funding from RTA sources, approximately \$400 million, but the state only provides \$29 million. He noted that RTA fulfills the mandate, but there is demand beyond the mandate and current resources are insufficient to meet it.

VI. Pace ReVision Update and Draft NWMC Resolution

Staff discussed Pace's ReVision planning efforts and the Conference's priorities for the plan, as well as a draft resolution outlining the Conference's preferred recommendations for the ReVision plan for consideration by the committee.

Ms. Rybarczyk said the resolution was well thought out, equitable, and considerate of the region's needs, especially for the partnerships with member communities necessary to make transit successful.

Ms. FioRito thanked Ms. Rybarczyk for her work, noting that many residents are already reliant on transit for equity reasons or ready to rely on transit, but the current lack of frequency diminishes its use opportunity.

Mayor Johnson asked whether the language sufficiently touch upon the needs of riders and the impact. Ms. FioRito mentioned the language is relatively broad, with the beginning mentioning the Coverage scenario, and there being a benefit to establishing successful service as a foundation and then expanding it.

Mayor Sanoica said that the resolution prioritizes ridership, followed by reestablishment of service, and fixed-routes returning to areas that were previously served, such as the unused Pace shelter in Rolling Meadows outside the Cook County courthouse, as an example where infrastructure still exists in a critical area. She noted that the coverage model seems short-sighted where routes can be more successful serving existing infrastructure.

Trustee Gens thanked Ms. Rybarczyk and the NWMC for the resolution, and said she supports reestablishment in preexisting service areas.

Mayor Johnson noted that ride hail apps established themselves below-cost but then afterwards hiked costs, and transit provides an economically accessible transportation service.

Mayor McLeod moved approval of the resolution. Trustee Bieschke seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

Mr. Kenyon inquired about the process following the Committee's approval. Mr. Fowler responded that the resolution would first go to the NWMC Executive Board and then to the full NWMC Board for consideration at its February meeting. Ms. Rybarczyk added that while Pace is formally closing its survey, it would continue to accept ordinances and resolutions from Councils of Governments and communities.

VII. Metropolitan Mobility Authority Act Legislation

NWMC staff provided an update on the changes made to the Metropolitan Mobility Authority Act from last year's bill, introduced as Senate Bill 5.

VIII. Other Business

NWMC staff reported that the USDOT RAISE and PROTECT grant programs, and the Bloomberg Philanthropy Asphalt Art grant, would close before the next Transportation Committee meeting.

IX. Next Meeting

Mayor Johnson announced that the next meeting of the NWMC Transportation Committee is scheduled for Thursday, February 27, 2025 at 8:30 a.m. at the NWMC offices and via videoconference.

X. Adjourn

Mayor Sanoica moved to adjourn the meeting at 10:07 a.m. Trustee Bieschke seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

Plan of Action for Regional Transit (PART)

PART outlined three areas that must work in tandem to address the \$730 million fiscal cliff facing our region in 2026 and strengthen our transit system: system improvements, funding solutions, and governance reforms. CMAP will continue to provide feedback and input in alignment with the PART report. We look forward to continued collaboration with partners, stakeholders, and legislators to strengthen transit in the region.

Since CMAP's delivery of the <u>PART report</u> to the General Assembly and Governor's Office, legislative deliberations about the future of transit funding have continued. Most recently, the Climate and Equitable Transportation Act (CETA) was filed, which includes three bills that address several transit and climate issues in the region. One component of CETA, the Metropolitan Mobility Authority Act, details several reforms to transit governance and operations in northeastern Illinois. A companion

appropriations bill was also introduced with the intent to provide \$1.5 billion in additional operating funds each year to transit across the region. Additionally, the Illinois Senate Transportation Committee recently concluded a series of legislative hearings across the region focused on transit reform. Meanwhile, Illinois House Speaker Emanuel "Chris" Welch has established a House Public Transit Working Group to closely examine the state's public transit system and develop recommendations for improvements and funding.

<u>The Imagery Explorer</u> showcases CMAP's large collection of historical aerial photographs of northeastern Illinois from 1970 through 1995. The archive includes 6,300 images in six of the region's counties. Historic aerial photographs are valuable resources for planning activities like landscape and land use analysis, environmental impact assessments, development projects, and education. These images provide a method for examining changes in properties, neighborhoods, and land use in general. You also can examine changes in historical, environmental, or architectural information about sites over time.

CTA developing long-term strategic plan

CTA recently launched its first-ever comprehensive, long-term strategic planning effort. 2023 IDOT National Highway System (NHS) pavement and bridge data

IDOT collects condition data on Interstate pavements annually and on non-Interstate pavements on a two-year cycle. Bridges receive a routine visual inspection at least every 2-4 years, depending on the condition. The results of the most recent NHS pavement condition assessments and bridge inspections, along with performance measures and targets, may be accessed on <u>IDOT's "Performance" webpage</u>.

2023 IDOT statewide crash data

On July 22, IDOT released <u>Circular Letter 2024-15</u> announcing that 2023 statewide crash data is now available. This information can be accessed by logging into "IDOT's Safety Portal" via this <u>link</u>. If you are a first-time user, please select "Create a New Account" and enter the required information.

Vulnerable Road User Safety Assessment (VRUSA)

The IDOT <u>Vulnerable Road User Safety Assessment (VRUSA</u>) is available for download and use. The VRUSA contains IDOT's efforts to help stakeholders identify programs and projects to address vulnerable road user safety through stakeholders' engagement and data analysis. It also outlines safety strategies based on the safe system approach with a profound consideration for equity principles. It is IDOT's intention for this document to be an important tool for stakeholders to continue to address the needs of VRU's in their communities.

To assist in the use of the VRUSA for the planning of future projects that address the safety of VRUs, a <u>VRUSA Dashboard</u> has been created that allows the user to view the results of the VRUSA data analysis in a way that can be filtered to specific areas of the state.

Funding opportunities

FHWA PROTECT grant opportunity

FHWA has posted the <u>Fiscal Years (FY) 2024-2026 Notice of Funding Opportunity</u> (NOFO) for the Promoting Resilient Operations for Transformative, Efficient, and Cost-Saving Transportation (PROTECT) Discretionary Grant Program, a competitive grant program created by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to help make surface transportation more resilient to natural hazards, including climate change, sea level rise, flooding, extreme weather events, and other natural disasters.

This NOFO offers a total of up to \$876 million in funding through two application periods, including up to \$576 million for FYs 2024 and 2025, and up to \$300 million for FY 2026. The FY 2024-2025 application period will remain open through **February 24, 2025**.

IDOT Bureau of Safety Programs and Engineering (BSPE) Highway Safety Program grant opportunity

The Illinois Department of Transportation's Bureau of Safety Programs and Engineering (BSPE) has posted six Highway Safety Program Notice of Funding Opportunities (NOFO) for the grant year of October 1, 2025 - September 30, 2026. Illinois is seeking grant applications to reduce serious injuries and fatalities on Illinois roadways.

All NOFO applications will be submitted in the State of Illinois' grant management system – AmpliFund. Applications for FY26 are due by **March 3, 2025, at 4:00 p.m.**

Invest in Cook grant opportunity

The Cook County Department of Transportation and Highways (DoTH) has announced a ninth round of Invest in Cook, an \$8.5 million grant program to help local Cook County governments and agency partners further their transportation projects by covering some of the cost of planning and feasibility studies, engineering, right-of-way acquisition and construction associated with transportation improvements.

Eligible applicants include local governments, regional transportation authorities, transit agencies, natural resource or public land agencies as well as any other local or regional governmental entity with responsibility for transportation or recreational trails **within Cook County.** The call for applications is open now and ends on **March 21, 2025 at 5 p.m.**

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February Local Government Update

Transit is the Answer Coalition to discuss *Transforming Transit* vision on February 11

In January the RTA unveiled <u>Transforming Transit</u> – a vision for a fully funded, seamless, and accountable transit system that serves all riders with more frequent and reliable service. Achieving this vision requires \$1.5 billion in new annual operating funding from state and local sources and strategic reform to establish a stronger RTA that is more accountable to riders and elected leaders on the issues they care about most.

The Transit is the Answer Coalition will meet on Tuesday, February 11 at 9:30 a.m. to provide the public with the opportunity to give feedback on this updated vision as legislative outreach and advocacy continue during the 2025 legislative session in Springfield. RTA staff will host a discussion and invite participants to both ask questions and provide feedback on potential funding and reform legislation and strategy. Registration is now open online.

A legislative solution to the transit fiscal cliff is needed before lawmakers adjourn this May to <u>avoid drastic service cuts</u>. Other states have acted on their regional transit fiscal cliffs, ranging from <u>partial solutions</u> to <u>providing new</u>, <u>sustainable</u> revenue to support transit.

Regional transit ridership increases third year in a row

Ridership across the Chicago region's transit system continued to increase throughout 2024, <u>according to the latest data from CTA, Metra, and Pace</u>. The region's fixed route system finished out the year with a total of 361 million rides – a 35 million increase from 2023. In 2024, CTA rail provided 127.5 million rides, an increase over 2023 of 9 percent. CTA buses provided 181.7 million rides, a year-over-year increase of 12 percent and the highest recovery rate of all modes at 77 percent of pre-pandemic levels. Metra saw a year-over-year ridership increase of 9 percent, providing nearly 35 million rides. Pace buses saw the largest ridership increase of 13 percent, providing 16.9 million rides.



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Community Planning Call for Projects opens March 10

For 27 years the RTA has supported local governments across the region through the <u>Community Planning</u> program, which provides technical assistance to municipalities to help foster the growth of sustainable, equitable, walkable, and transit-friendly communities. Projects funded by the program this year include:

- Equitable Transit-Oriented Development Plans
- Transit Corridor Plans
- Neighborhood Access & Improvement Plans
- Curb Management Studies
- Zoning Code Updates
- Special Financing Districts
- Developer Dialogues

The 2025 Call for Projects, which is hosted in partnership with the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning, will open from March 10 – April 10.

Section 5310 Program Call for Projects opens March 20

The <u>Section 5310 Program</u> is a federal formula grant program that provides funding assistance to public transportation projects that focus on enhancing mobility for seniors and individuals with disabilities. As a co-designated recipient of the Section 5310 Program, RTA awards and administers funding to operating, mobility management, capital improvement projects, and associated administrative expenses to non-profit and local government providers of eligible transportation programs. The 2025 Call for Projects opens on March 20 and applications are due by April 24.
