I. Call to Order

Mayor Johnson called the meeting to order at 8:34 a.m.

II. April 24, 2025 Meeting Minutes

Trustee Benton moved approval of the April 24, 2025 meeting minutes. Mayor McLeod seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

III. Agency Reports

a. CMAP

Report attached.

b. Cook County Department of Transportation and Highways

Mr. Ruehle said that the list of road projects for Quarter 1 of 2025 will be updated in July. He announced an upcoming Safety Action Plan Workshop to be held on May 22 which will provide support on how the Cook County Safety Action Plan can be used by municipalities for Safe Streets and Roads for All grants.

c. IDOT Highways

Ms. Herdus said that IDOT is currently waiting for the release of the 2026-2030 program, which will be shared at a date to be determined in the future.

d. IDOT Local Roads

Report attached.

e. Illinois Tollway

Ms. Passi reported that the Tollway continues its Bridging the Future program. She added that the IPASS On Demand Team offers customer service, including IPASS Assist, for community events and are available nights and weekends. She also noted that Tollway has developed an event calendar showing where the team will be, which is available on the Tollway website. Additionally, she added that Tollway also has newsletter and blog post information available for sharing by communities. Finally, she reminded the committee that *999 is available for Tollway concerns and emergency services.

f. Metra

Ms. Dote shared that Metra is conducting its <u>Operation Lifesaver safety blitz</u>, distributing educational materials and gathering rider safety concerns at locations across the region, including Barrington on August 7.

She noted that Metra system ridership is at 62% of 2019 numbers, with Milwaukee District North at 61%, Milwaukee District West at 54%, North Central Service at 49%, Union Pacific North at 84%, and Union Pacific Northwest at 67%.

g. Pace

Ms. Rybarczyk announced that Pace's On Board newsletter is distributed quarterly on buses for passengers. She said that customer satisfaction surveys are now underway, and Pace has begun surveying its ADA Paratransit riders. She noted that ADA Trip Check allows Pace paratransit and Dial a Ride users to track rides via apps, with information available in Spanish and Polish.

She also reported that Pace has begun its I-290/I-88 Express Bus study. She said that the project consists of a 5-mile radius of the I-290 corridor, studying opportunities for Bus on Shoulder development and key destination connections. Ms. Rybarczyk shared that the first public meeting will be held June 5 at the Forest Park Public Library.

Mayor McLeod noted that Pace ridership was at 75% of 2019 levels, with ADA ridership above 2019 levels and thanked Pace employees for their work. Ms. Rybarczyk added that the region's aging population and their desire to

age in place establishes the importance of paratransit services. Mayor McLeod said that the proposed Pace ReVision changes concern him about decreased access to paratransit services.

h. RTA

Mr. Braun said that more than 11,000 letters have been sent to legislators as part of RTA's transit legislation campaign. He added that RTA has launched its Save ADA campaign which is focused on paratransit riders. He noted that RTA has released its Transform Transit legislative language to lawmakers, although no bill has been introduced yet.

IV. Transit Legislation

NWMC staff provided an update on the status of proposed transit legislation. Mr. Czarnota provided details on the differences in the proposed Metropolitan Mobility Act, United We Move Illinois and RTA Transforming Transit pieces of legislation. Mr. Larson said that the NWMC lobbying team has told them that legislators appear interested in a funding framework going with a governance reform bill, and that legislators want board members with expertise in transit and transportation, not just municipal voices. Mr. Larson said that NWMC has consistently advocated for inclusion of municipal voices in any governance structure and appointing procedures to ensure fair representation from suburban municipalities. He added that if no bill is passed, there is discussion about a special legislative summer session to address the fiscal cliff and/or reforms, and the NWMC will continue to monitor and will notify the Committee and request feedback where necessary.

Mr. Bury said that Capitol Fax reported that potential funding for the new system could be transportation-related, including a \$1 online delivery fee. He added that it appears an agreement is coming together on governance language and an analysis would be available soon.

V. Future Transportation Committee Dates

Mr. Czarnota presented the proposed meeting dates for 2025-2026.

Mayor McLeod moved to approve the recommended meeting schedule. Mayor Sanoica seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

VI. Funding and Training Opportunities

NWMC staff provided an update on transportation-related funding and training opportunities. Mr. Czarnota shared the <u>IDOT 2024 Local Project Funding program</u>, <u>CMAP Accessible Public Engagement Training</u>, and <u>IDOT Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP)</u>. Mr. Larson shared the <u>Safe Streets for All (SS4A)</u> program, <u>Cook County Safety Action Plan Grant Workshop</u>, <u>Rebuild Illinois</u> funds, and the IDOT <u>Safe Routes to School</u> program. Mr. Larson added that NWMC staff are happy to assist with letters of support for applications to any of the programs.

VII. Other Business

Trustee Gens thanked the committee and NWMC staff for a conversation regarding opportunities for municipal strategic planning, noting that a speed reduction campaign will be included in the Mount Prospect strategic plan.

Mr. Larson thanked members of the committee for a productive year, and encouraged members to re-apply to participate in the committee next year or solicit additional members from their community to apply.

The updated 2025 CMAP <u>Community Data Snapshots</u> are available. The annual snapshots provide data-driven profiles for every county, municipality, and Chicago Community Area (CCA) in our region. The snapshots include updated demographic, socioeconomic, and employment data from the American Community Survey (ACS) datasets, updated land use summaries using data from the <u>Land Use Inventory</u>, and updated estimated vehicle miles traveled per household.

Surface Transportation Program

The <u>STP Project Selection Committee</u> last met on May 15, 2025. The committee's next meeting is scheduled for **November 6, 2025**. <u>Meeting Materials</u> are posted on CMAP's Legistar site one week in advance of the meetings. Program status reports for the STP Shared Fund, based on quarterly updates submitted by project sponsors, and an accounting of available, programmed, and obligated funds for the region are available on the <u>STP webpage</u>.

On June 12, 2025, the MPO Policy Committee approved STP funding for <u>8 projects</u> to be added to the program for federal fiscal years 2026 through 2030.

Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ), Carbon Reduction (CRP), and Transportation Alternatives (TAP-L)

The most recent <u>CMAQ Project Selection Committee</u> meeting was held on May 15, 2025. Accessible Communities Program

CMAP is excited to launch the newest initiative in our Accessible Communities program: the <u>Regional ADA Coordinators Group</u>. Regional ADA Coordinators Group is a peer professional development group to provide resources and support to ADA coordinators.

CMAP launched the Accessible Communities Program to help communities in northeastern Illinois improve accessibility for their residents and visitors with disabilities. Essential information about

improving accessibility can be found on this <u>CMAP webpage</u> and in the Accessible Communities newsletter. Recordings and slides for CMAP's ADA trainings, which cover ADA and Title II requirements, completing a self-evaluation, the role of an ADA coordinator, developing a transition plan, and PROWAG are <u>available</u>. CMAP has also developed <u>templates and guidance</u> that public entities can use to help meet their legal obligations of providing an ADA notice, grievance procedure, and designating an ADA coordinator.

Explore the CMAP data hub

CMAP's <u>Data Hub</u> provides vetted and trustworthy information about northeastern Illinois so local governments, community organizations, academic researchers, and businesses can learn and make informed decisions about their communities. The Data Hub allows you to search or browse by categories and tags. You can find tables or shapefiles for transit routes and stops, land use inventory, greenhouse gas emissions, economically disconnected and disinvested areas, bikeway inventory system, and more!

2024 IDOT crash data

On August 11, 2025, IDOT released <u>Circular Letter 2025-11</u> announcing the availability of the 2024 crash data. This data set provides important crash information required for the identification of areas of improvement, work on safety studies, and the analysis on the location and number of crashes. The data can be accessed through <u>IDOT's Safety Portal</u>.

2023 IDOT National Highway System (NHS) pavement and bridge data

IDOT collects condition data on Interstate pavements annually and on non-Interstate pavements on a two-year cycle. Bridges receive a routine visual inspection at least every 2-4 years, depending on the condition. The results of the most recent NHS pavement condition assessments and bridge inspections, along with performance measures and targets, may be accessed on IDOT's "Performance" webpage.

Vulnerable Road User Safety Assessment (VRUSA)

The IDOT <u>Vulnerable Road User Safety Assessment (VRUSA)</u> is available for download and use. The VRUSA contains IDOT's efforts to help stakeholders identify programs and projects to address vulnerable road user safety through stakeholders' engagement and data analysis. It also outlines safety strategies based on the safe system approach with a profound consideration for equity principles. It is IDOT's intention for this document to be an important tool for stakeholders to continue to address the needs of VRU's in their communities.

To assist in the use of the VRUSA for the planning of future projects that address the safety of VRUs, a <u>VRUSA Dashboard</u> has been created that allows the user to view the results of the VRUSA data analysis in a way that can be filtered to specific areas of the state.

Funding opportunities

IDOT Safe Routes to School Cycle 2025

On July 11, 2025, the Illinois Department of Transportation released <u>Circular Letter 2025-10</u> detailing the notice of funding opportunity for the 2025 <u>Illinois Safe Routes to School (SRTS)</u> program. IDOT will be accepting applications for the SRTS grant beginning **August 1, 2025, through October 13, 2025**. The SRTS supports projects and programs that enable and encourage walking, rolling, and bicycling to and from school. SRTS will be 100% funded and require no local match.

To assist in your preparation of the upcoming cycle, the IDOT has partnered with Active Transportation Alliance to offer an informational webinar series. The final webinar is scheduled for **September 17** from 11 am to 1 pm. Each webinar date has a unique agenda and applicants are encouraged to register for each date. Registration, recordings, and additional information are available on the <u>SRTS website</u>.

IEPA Green Infrastructure Grant Opportunities (GIGO)

The <u>Green Infrastructure Grant Opportunities (GIGO)</u> program utilizes funds distributed by the State of Illinois generated under the Build Illinois Bond Fund. Illinois EPA's Notice of Funding Opportunity includes \$5,000,000 in funding for projects that will improve water quality in Illinois. GIGO has set a maximum total grant award of \$2,500,000 with a minimum grant award of \$75,000. The GIGO program funds projects to construct green infrastructure best management practices (BMPs) that prevent, eliminate, or reduce stormwater runoff into Illinois' rivers, streams, and lakes.

Eligible projects will construct BMPs to decrease stormwater runoff prior to release into rivers, streams, and lakes, and include:

- Reconnection of a stream with its floodplain (e.g., two-stage ditch, daylighting);
- Treatment and flow control of stormwater runoff at sites directly upstream or downstream of an impervious area that currently impacts river, stream, or lake water quality through stormwater runoff discharge; and/or
- 3. Treatment and flow control of water generated from impervious surfaces associated with urban development (such as roads and buildings).

Applications are being accepted now through **November 5, 2025**. Full application details and more information are included in the <u>Notice of Funding Opportunity</u> through AmpliFund.

Transportation professionals, planners, local governments, MPOs, consultants, and advocates from across Illinois are encouraged to <u>register</u> now.

Invest in Cook 2025 Program

Eight grantees in the Northwest Municipal Conference were awarded Invest in Cook funding for the 2025 program, including two roadway, three pedestrian, two bike, and one transit service projects. More information on these projects can be found at https://www.cookcountyil.gov/investincook.

Rail Infill Station Study Status

CCDoTH is teaming up with CDOT, CTA, and Metra to holistically study where future rail stations may be warranted along rail transit lines in Cook County. The study is compiling a list of candidate sites, which will be assessed, screened, and prioritized using a combination of quantitative and qualitative measures. As part of the screening effort, a public survey will be launched this fall, which will solicit ideas for where stations should be considered. The study will ultimately produce a recommended set of stations for further development by the transit agencies.

Cook County Safety Action Plan

The CMAP Policy Committee accepted the Cook County Safety Action Plan on May 30, 205, and the report is available here: https://engage.cmap.illinois.gov/cook. The plan describes crash trends, issues, and the High Injury Network for all roads in Cook County from 2018 through 2022. The report provides recommendations for policy, program, and infrastructure improvements to reduce fatalities and serious injuries from traffic crashes. The plan makes all governmental entities in Cook County eligible for demonstration and implementation grants under the USDOT Safe Streets for All program.

2026 Regional Transit Budget funding amounts approved

At its August meeting, the RTA Board of Directors approved the <u>2026-28 Funding Marks Ordinance</u>, establishing operating funding amounts and required recovery ratios for CTA, Meta, and Pace. The ordinance also provides each Service Board with preliminary estimates of funds available for the development of the 2026-2030 Capital Program.

With the fiscal cliff approaching and the lack of state action to provide additional operations funding, this year's funding marks process differs significantly from prior years. The proposed 2026 operating funding amounts include one-time shifts of \$75 million in limited discretionary funding to help align our services regionally and delay CTA's fiscal cliff, which is anticipated to arrive before those of Metra and Pace. This shift of funding is for 2026 only and will not affect planned service levels – all operating agencies will see their funding increase from 2025 levels. The goal behind shifting funds is to delay the impact of the fiscal cliff on transit service and provide legislators more time to address the crisis before harming riders.

These one-time steps will not structurally solve the fiscal cliff – our ask from the state does not change and we anticipate the structural funding gap to remain at around 20% of our regional operating budget.

ADA Paratransit Action Plan to address budget deficit

In 2024 Pace launched the Rideshare Access Program (RAP), expanding consumer subsidies for ADA paratransit riders to rideshare companies Uber and UZURV. The program, similar to Pace's Taxi Access Program (TAP), has since become highly popular and costs have created a significant gap in the ADA paratransit budget – in 2024 the region faced a \$25.5 million shortfall that was mitigated by a one-time disbursement of ADA paratransit reserve funds. RTA staff estimates that total 2025 ADA ridership will exceed budget producing a potential shortfall of \$35-65 million without action.

In May 2025, the RTA Board recommended an ADA Paratransit Action Plan to manage the continued growth of RAP and TAP. The Action Plan recommends immediate actions such as capping monthly rides, matching traditional ADA

Future recommendations include a fare increase for traditional ADA paratransit service, adjustments to RAP and TAP parameters, and better aligning county-based rideshare programs and RAP to standardize fares.

After a series of public hearings in July, the RTA Board at its August meeting adopted an <u>ordinance</u> approving the use a combination of the remaining balance of the RTA's ADA Paratransit Reserve, regional discretionary funds, and Pace funding to address the paratransit budget shortfall. The ordinance also directs Pace to take mitigation measures to achieve budget balance with this funding, outlined in the Action Plan.

Transit is the Answer Coalition provides feedback on funding, reform as fiscal cliff nears

More than 200 riders, advocates, and other stakeholders met virtually with the RTA on Wednesday, August 13 for the eighth quarterly Transit is the Answer Coalition meeting and discussed the 2026 budget process, how peer regions are addressing their fiscal cliffs, and House Bill 3438, the funding and reform bill that passed the Illinois Senate during the General Assembly's spring legislative session but was not called for a vote in the House. RTA to award more than \$16M for mobility projects

At its August meeting, the RTA Board approved a program of projects that will make it easier for older adults and people with disabilities to get to jobs, medical appointments, the grocery store, social activities, and more. The Section 5310
Program is a federal formula grant program that provides assistance to public transportation projects that focus on enhancing mobility for seniors and individuals with disabilities. Projects serving the NWMC membership area include:

- Little City Foundation | <u>Little City Foundation Transportation</u> | \$500,000 in federal funds with \$500,000 local matching funds.
- RTA | Regional Dial-a-Ride Coordination Study | \$350,000 in federal funds.

RTA staff will now prepare the official application to the Federal Transit Administration and will issue grant agreements to subrecipients in the first and second quarters of 2026. More information and a full list of selected projects can be found on the RTA Connections blog.

Recognizing the vital importance of safe, efficient, and accessible public transit in the broader metropolitan region, the undersigned councils of governments representing 3.4 million residents ("the COGs") support thoughtful reforms to our transit system that address both current demands and future growth.

Governance and Representation

The COGs urge the General Assembly to adopt a governance structure that fosters regional consensus among the collar counties, suburban Cook County, and the City of Chicago. This structure must include:

- Supermajority voting thresholds (four-fifths) for major policy decisions such as the budget, strategic plan, and capital program, mirroring the Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP) model.
- **Parity of representation** across geographic areas to ensure fair input from all parts of the metropolitan region according to the population distribution.
- **Inclusion of municipal elected officials** on transit governance boards, recognizing their essential role in addressing local and regional transit needs.

Local Authority and Transit-Oriented Development

The COGs strongly oppose any legislation that undermines municipal authority over land use and development. Local governments have a proven track record of working collaboratively with developers to support transit-oriented development that aligns with community planning goals.

Mandates from the state, such as eliminating parking minimums, risk imposing one-size-fits-all solutions that disregard local conditions. In many suburban areas, residents still rely heavily on personal vehicles due to insufficient bus service and last-mile connectivity. Instead, the COGs support incentive-based programs that encourage development near transit while respecting local control.

Transit Funding

To address anticipated funding shortfalls, any discussion of new revenues must be preceded by a serious commitment to improving administrative efficiencies and maximizing the use of existing resources. Taxpayer dollars must be managed responsibly, and administrative savings should be identified and reinvested before pursuing additional revenue.

After exhausting these cost-saving strategies and recognizing the need to invest in expanding transit services in suburban communities, the COGs urge the General Assembly to explore sustainable revenue mechanisms related to the use of transportation infrastructure. We welcome continued dialogue on the following revenue options:

- Motor Vehicle-Related Contributions Explore adjustments to vehicle-related fees or taxes to encourage the utilization of public transit and reflect the costs of maintaining and improving transportation infrastructure.
- **Farebox Recovery Ratio** Maintenance of the 50% Farebox Recovery Ratio, including any fare increases to achieve it within a reasonable time.

- Freight and Goods Movement Revenue Consider revenue from freight rail operations or goods movement that impact regional infrastructure and transit operations, particularly as freight activity grows in the metropolitan area.
- Entertainment and Large Venue Activity Fees Evaluate opportunities for transit-related revenue from high-volume events or venues that benefit from proximity to transit access, especially in dense urban cores.
- **Transit Fare Adjustments** Review fare structures and potential increases that align with service improvements, equity considerations, and operational sustainability.
- **Mobility Service Surcharges** Explore additional surcharges on ride-share or other on-demand mobility services to support regional transit infrastructure and first/last-mile connectivity.
- Additional Airport passenger fees/taxes Currently, airports are subject to federally imposed taxes such as the U.S. Government Excise Tax (\$4.00 per segment), September 11 Security Fee (\$5.60 per segment) and Passenger Facility Charges (up to \$4.50 per segment). Explore the ability to collect additional fees and direct to regional transit operations.

In addition, we **oppose revenue mechanisms that unfairly burden suburban communities**, such as expanding the real estate transfer tax, particularly when our communities must first obtain referendum approval to implement similar revenue policies. These measures would disproportionately impact suburban residents while providing limited local benefit.

Commitment to Collaboration

The COGs remain committed to working with the General Assembly and regional stakeholders to advance a transit reform package that:

- Fairly represents suburban communities in governance,
- Delivers meaningful cost savings and additional revenue for expanded and improved service,
- Establishes clear timelines for addressing service gaps and improving interconnectivity,
- Prioritizes safety and security.

We look forward to helping shape a transit system that reflects the needs of all communities and promotes long-term, equitable investment across the region.
