- **B. CCDOTH** Ms. Diaz announced that the 2022 highway construction project map is now available to be viewed.

On December 27, 2020, Title IV of the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act, 2021 (CRRSAA) was enacted. This Act included a local government component that resulted in the allocation of \$42,647,247 to be programmed and managed by CMAP. In the fall of 2021, the STP Project Selection Committee and local councils of mayors selected <u>33 individual project phases</u> to be fully or partially funded with CRRSAA funding. The <u>Regional CRRSAA Program Status Report</u> and <u>Regional CRRSAA Accounting Summary</u> were updated in July 2022.

Regional Safety Action Agenda

CMAP is in the process of expanding the agency's safety work to become the Safe and Complete Streets program. This program will increase the capacity and work related to improving the region's traffic safety environment. It will continue and build on the work of the Safety Action Agenda and align the effort with new federal funding opportunities including: the development of policy related to speed management, bicycle and pedestrian safety; the creation of safety action plans for qualifying local partners, the dedication of resources to planning and implementing complete streets projects and the creation of data resources for partners to better address safety. Community Data Snapshots

CMAP has refreshed its <u>Community Data Snapshots</u> with updated 5-year American Community Survey (ACS) data, and employment and tax base tables. IDOT accepting electronic signatures on Bureau of Local Roads forms

On August 19, 2022 IDOT issued <u>circular letter 2022-21</u> announcing updates to more than twenty local roads forms to accommodate the use of electronic signatures. A list of the affected forms and instructions for electronically signing forms is included in the circular letter.

Updated PPI Form

The IDOT District 1 PPI form, PI0004, has been updated as of August 31, 2022 and can be found on the IDOT website under 'Forms' and 'District 1.' Any PPIs submitted on the old form after September 1, 2022 will be returned for revisions.

IDOT releases the FY 2023-2028 Multi-Year Program

On Friday, August 12, IDOT released the <u>FY 2023-2028 Proposed Highway Program</u>, which includes \$34.6 billion to improve roads, bridges, transit, rail, airports, and ports over the next six years. The program aims to improve 2,562 miles of roads and nearly 10 million square feet of bridge deck. This funding represents a robust commitment to invest in people and communities backed by the historic Rebuild Illinois capital program. Read the press release <u>here</u>.

Funding Opportunities

Illinois Transportation Enhancement Program (ITEP)

IDOT is accepting applications for the latest cycle of ITEP funding. The funding cycle is the largest ever because of the Rebuild Illinois capital program, and it dedicates resources to communities with the greatest needs. Eligible projects include biking and walking paths, trails, streetscape beautification, and other improvements designed to encourage safer travel. Applications are due **September 30, 2022**. The Active Transportation Alliance and Illinois Public Health Institute, in partnership with IDOT, hosted a 3-part webinar series to help communities apply for funding. Railroad Crossing Elimination (RCE) Discretionary Grant Program

The Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) is accepting applications for the Railroad Crossing Elimination Program. Eligible projects include grade separation or closure as well as improvements or installation of protective devices, signals, signs, or other related systems. Applications for planning, environmental review, and design will also be accepted. The FRA will not award grants for less than \$1,000,000, except for planning projects. No more than 20% of the funds can be awarded in any state. Applications are due **October 4, 2022.** IDOT also issued <u>Circular Letter 2022-19</u> providing more information about this program. Illinois Special Bridge Program, State Fiscal Year (SFY) 2028 Notice of Funding Opportunity On August 30, 2022, IDOT issued <u>circular letter 2022-22</u> announcing the SFY 2028 notice of funding opportunity for the Special Bridge Program. Funding is for existing structures that meet STP-Bridge eligibility, not for constructing new structures. In addition, the structure must carry a highway. Only the construction and construction engineering cost will be eligible for funding, and the federal share is 80 percent of the eligible cost. The application, PRO 2171, is available on the <u>IDOT website</u> under "Programming." Applications are due to the appropriate District Local Roads office by **October 11th**, **2022**. U.S. DOT Reconnecting Communities Pilot Program

U.S. DOT is accepting applications for the <u>Reconnecting Communities Pilot Program</u> (RCP). Funds for the FY 2022 RCP Program will be awarded on a competitive basis for projects that reconnect communities by removing, retrofitting, or mitigating highways or other transportation facilities that create barriers to community connectivity, including to mobility, access, or economic development. Information to register and view recordings from the series of RCP webinars is available <u>here</u>. Applications are due by **October 13, 2022.** IDOT also issued <u>Circular Letter 2022-18</u> about this program.

Other News

Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) replaces DUNS Number

In April 2022, the federal government stopped using the DUNS Number to uniquely identify entities and is now using the Unique Entity ID (UEI) created in SAM.gov. Entities, such as local governments, previously registered in SAM.gov already have an UEI assigned that is viewable when you sign in to your SAM.gov account. Metra to create battery-powered locomotives

Plan demonstrates agency's commitment to innovation and cleaner energy

CHICAGO (August 17, 2022) – The Metra Board of Directors today approved a first-ofits-kind plan to convert up to six of Metra's oldest diesel locomotives to zero-emission battery power.

"This procurement puts Metra on the cutting edge of battery-powered technology and demonstrates our commitment to innovation and cleaner energy," said Metra CEO/Executive Director Jim Derwinski. "If these locomotives prove themselves, they could play a significant role in our fleet and in our future, and the concept could serve as a template for other railroads to follow."

The contract with Progress Rail calls for a base order of three locomotives with options for three more. The total cost for all six locomotive conversions, which will be performed in Patterson, Georgia, is \$34.6 million. Completing the base order is expected to take about 3½ years.

Metra plans to test the battery-powered locomotives, which will have an estimated range of about 150 miles, on the Rock Island Line. Charging stations, which will be designed after the locomotives are designed, will be placed in the main yard and at an outlying point. The duration of a full and partial recharge of the batteries won't be known until then.

By replacing diesel power with battery power, Metra will significantly reduce its emissions footprint and greatly improve air quality for its riders and the Chicago region. The

battery-powered locomotives are expected to be less noisy and have lower operating costs and lower maintenance costs than diesel locomotives.

The zero-emission locomotives will be fully compatible with Metra's existing railcars and diesel locomotives, and must be capable of providing a safe and comfortable ride at all speeds up to the maximum speed of 79 mph. The batteries must also power onboard systems, such as lighting, intercoms and HVAC. The locomotives may be painted in a green version of Metra's paint scheme (per the conceptual illustrations) to indicate the green technology.

Metra has taken other recent steps to reduce its diesel emissions, including:

- Seeking to purchase six switch locomotives that meet the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Tier IV emissions standards, the highest standards currently in effect, and one zero-emission, all electric-powered switch locomotive.
- Ordering 15 remanufactured locomotives that meet the EPA's Tier 3 emissions standards, with an option to buy up to 27 more. These locomotives will be replacing Tier 0 emissions locomotives currently in service. The first of those locomotives is expected to be delivered before the end of the year.

Major tie project to start on the UP-North Line

68,000 ties to be replaced between Chicago and Kenosha during overnight hours

CHICAGO (Sept. 13, 2022) – Union Pacific Railroad will embark on a major tie project beginning Tuesday, Sept. 20 along a 45-mile stretch of the UP North Line between Kenosha and Chicago.

Union Pacific, which owns and maintains the three UP lines in the Metra system, will replace approximately 68,000 ties between Kenosha and the line's Ravenswood Station in Chicago. To lessen impacts on the current train schedule as well as the communities along the line, work will occur between 7 p.m. and 5 a.m. seven days a week through November. Union Pacific believes that this schedule will allow the work to progress more quickly, lessening the impact to communities along the line.

"Tie replacement is essential and must be done at regular intervals to maintain track speeds and service levels," said Metra Executive Director/CEO Jim Derwinski. "We understand that track work during the evening overnight hours will affect the communities near the work zones and that any delays are an inconvenience for our riders. However, accelerating the work schedule and doing it during off-peak hours should minimize these impacts."

Metra riders may experience minor delays during the evening and some late-night train schedules may be adjusted as the work moves closer to Chicago. Communities along the tracks will experience increased noise levels, including train horns, during work periods. Federal law requires trains to sound their horns when entering a track work zone even if the work takes place in a community that is regulated as a quiet zone. Union Pacific believes that the accelerated work schedule will mean that each community should only experience direct impacts for two to three days as the project moves down the tracks.

Track changes may occur as trains work around the track workers, and customers are advised to listen for platform announcements throughout the project to verify the boarding platform well in advance of a train's arrival at their station.

The project is expected to last through the end of November. Any changes to the current train schedule will be posted at *metra.com*.

September 2022 Update

Strategic plan working groups release items for action and advocacy

The RTA Strategic Plan Stakeholder Working Groups have concluded, and the RTA is sharing the <u>2023 Agenda for Advocacy and Action</u> that outlines priorities for the future of transit in northeastern Illinois. The RTA is seeking feedback on these items and the strategic planning process ahead of publishing the draft strategic plan this fall. A survey is <u>available</u>, and the RTA has developed a <u>toolkit</u> for survey promotion.

RTAMS launches Capital Projects Dashboard

As part of the RTA's continued commitment to transparency, the agency has launched a new <u>Capital Projects Dashboard</u>, mapping more than 150 capital projects throughout the region. The dashboard includes a map that displays the location of projects in the 2022-2026 RTA Regional Capital Program as well as those being monitored by the <u>Project Management Oversight</u> team, providing a unique opportunity to see the distribution of capital projects throughout the region.

RTA selects projects for Access to Transit program

The RTA has <u>selected</u> ten projects for its Access to Transit program, which provides funding to municipalities to complete engineering and construction for small-scale capital improvements, such as filling sidewalk gaps and installing covered bicycle parking, that improve pedestrian and bicycle connections to transit. This group of new projects will be the sixth group accepted to the program, which has funded 37 projects since the program began.

Highlights from the 2022 Access to Transit program include bicycle and pedestrian improvements in Harvey to connect to Metra and Pace, shared-use bicycle access to Pace stations in Plainfield, and a pedestrian access study in Ford Heights.

2022 RTA Community Planning call for projects, 2021 RTA Local Planning implementation report

Every year, the RTA's Local Planning department assists local governments throughout northeastern Illinois on projects that build on the strength of the region's transit system through two programs: <u>Community Planning</u> and <u>Access to Transit</u>. These programs provide funding and technical assistance for local governments to plan for pedestrian friendly, multi-modal, equitable, and accessible communities. The 2022 Community Planning call for projects will open on September 26 with applications due on October 14. The new program of projects will be presented to the RTA Board in February, and project initiation begins in March 2023.

To demonstrate the impact of the Community Planning and Access to Transit programs, the RTA recently published its <u>2021 Local Planning Implementation Story Map</u>. This interactive report highlights 21 RTA-supported projects around the region that are starting soon, in progress, or recently completed. You can learn more about Community Planning and Access to Transit, including application details, on the RTA website.

Pace, Metra, and CTA receive Bipartisan Infrastructure Law funds

Pace, Metra, and CTA recently received grants associated with the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL). Pace and Metra were <u>awarded</u> a \$20 million Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant for the Harvey Transportation Center to modernize the facility and provide a better connection to the Metra station. Among other planning projects done in Harvey, the RTA recently completed a <u>Transit-Oriented Development Plan Update</u>.

CTA received two grants to electrify its fleet and modernize operations. First, the agency was <u>awarded</u> \$28 million from the Federal Transit Administration's Bus and Low- and No-Emission Grants. The funds will be used to purchase electric buses and to upgrade infrastructure at the Humboldt Park bus garage. Second, the City of Chicago <u>received</u> a \$4 million grant to fund the Chicago Centralized Transit Signal Priority Project from the Federal Highway Administration's (FHWA) Advanced Transportation and Congestion Management Technologies Deployment (ATCMTD) program, which will help deploy signal timing technology to prioritize CTA buses at lights in the central business district.
